##### NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION

Notice is hereby given that a special election of the City of Nyssa, Malheur County, Oregon, will be held at the City Hall of the City of Nyssa, which is the polling place designated for said election for all precincts within said City, on the 26th day of April, 1963, between the hours of 9:00 o'clock a.m. and 7:00 o'clock p.m., for the purpose of submitting to the legal voters of said City the following question:

"Shall the City Council of the City of Nyssa, Malheur County, Oregon, levy a special tax of \$13,000.00, annually, for the fiscal years 1963/1964, 1964/1965, 1965/1966, 1966/1967 and 1967/1968, outside the limitations imposed by Article XI, Section 11, of the Constitution of the State of Oregon, upon all taxable property within said City for the purpose of financing the cost of cleaning, repairing and maintaining the streets, alleys and roadways throughout the City of Nyssa and the purchase, replacement, repair and maintenance of equipment used in said connection?"

The vote shall be by ballot, upon which shall be the words, "For Tax Levy—Yes" and "For Tax Levy—No" and the voter shall place a cross (x) between the words "For Tax Levy" and the word "Yes" or between the words "For Tax Levy" and the word "No," whichever indicates his choice.
