### Rites for Ed Corfield Conducted Saturday At Owyhee Church

Funeral services for Charles Edward (Ed) Corfield were conducted Saturday afternoon, April 6, 1963, at Owyhee Community church. The Rev. Arthur Skogan, pastor of the church, and Robert Kriner, Jr., former pastor, were officiating ministers. Mr. Corfield succumbed last Thursday at his home.

He was born May 6, 1889, in Shropshire, England, and came to America at the age of six months with his parents who settled in Nebraska. Most of his childhood was spent at Swanton, Neb., and from there the family moved to Minden, Neb., where Mr. Corfield started working out at an early age.

When he was 17 years old, he moved to Maxwell, Neb., where he began farming for himself and met Clara Bellamy. They were married on Christmas day in 1913 by the Rev. John Griffith. The couple's golden anniversary would have been on Christmas day this year.

In 1915 the Corfields moved to Basin, Wyo., where they purchased a sagebrush farm, developed it and made a home for eight children. In 1935 they moved to the Nyssa area where they bought and improved another sagebrush farm.

Mr. Corfield was a devoted husband and father and was fond of being at home with his family. He entertained numerous youngsters on many occasions with folk songs and stories. Those who knew him well state that he had a wonderful sense of humor which added joy and encouragement to all.

He was a deacon in the Owyhee Community church Sunday school and worked faithfully in the church for many years.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by one son, Glen Philip of Pendleton; five daughters, Mrs. Emily Ann Myers of Salt Lake City, Mrs. Cora Grace Hann of Pasco, Wash., Mrs. Viola May Holmes of Portland, Mrs. Dorothy Pattee of Parma and Mrs. Carroll Aten of Sacramento, Calif.

Also surviving are 22 grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

Two sons, Chester Edward and Harold Joe, preceded their father in death on Nov. 7, 1952. They were killed in a tragic accident when a bridge collapsed.

Interment was made in Owyhecemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Active pallbearers were Joe Stephen, John Price, John Strickland, Harold Dail, Wayne Robb and Kenneth Lorensen. Honorary bearers included Lester Oden, Otis Bullard, James Stephen and Glenn Strickland.


