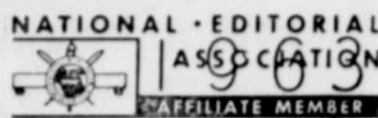

Dr. Kuiper Named Associate Professor At Presbyterian Theological Seminary

The Rev. Dr. G. J. Kuiper, pastor of the Kingman Memorial Community United Presbyterian church of Adrian, Ore., has received appointment at the Theological seminary, Johnson C. Smith university in Charlotte, N.C.

The appointment is that of associate professor of New Testament. As head of the department of New Testament, Dr. Kuiper will teach courses in that area. With Mrs. Kuiper he will participate in the life of the seminary family.

Other responsibilities will include individual research and writing, and the building up of the New Testament section of the seminary library.

The seminary, founded in 1867, is one of the seven seminaries for the training of ministers and full-time church workers of the United Presbyterian church in the U.S.A. It grants the graduate degree of bachelor of divinity. Dr. and Mrs. Kuiper will be leaving for Charlotte on July 29.

Dr. Kuiper became pastor of the United Presbyterian congregation in Adrian on July 1, 1961. Since September 1962 he has also been a part-time lecturer in religion at the College of Idaho in Caldwell. He has asked that his resignation as pastor of the Adrian congregation become effective on April 30, 1962.

The church session of the Adrian congregation has announced the congregational meeting to be held on April 24 at 8 p.m. in the church to discuss the resignation and to join with Dr. Kuiper in requesting that the Presbytery of Boise dissolve the pastoral relationship.

The Kuipers wish to thank their friends and acquaintances for the kindness and friendship shown to them during their two years in Adrian. With sadness they will part from the community and area as they respond to the challenges of new responsibilities.

They will also be leaving Caldwell, Dr. Kuiper's hometown since 1950, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. Kuiper, are residing.
