**Sen. Yturri Discusses Constitution Revision**

(Continued from Page 1) Senate, of which I am a member on the Senate side, meet jointly but vote separately. If these committees reach agreement upon the form of document to be submitted to the people for their acceptance or rejection, then such proposed document will go to each house of the legislature. The House and Senate, by a two-thirds vote each, must pass the form submitted by the committee. If this occurs, the people will then be required to vote upon the one huge package which will be submitted to them. If the necessary two-thirds vote is not obtained in each body of the legislature, then we will struggle along with our present antiquated instrument. It is conceded that the Constitution should be the basic document of the state and that it should contain only the fundamental and basic tenets of government that will control and govern all laws and operations of the state of Oregon.

of state treasurer and secretary of state, and provisions that the governor shall be the only elected official.

3. Abolition of the attorney general and labor commissioner as elective officials and having them appointed by the governor.

4. Condensing all functions of the executive branch in no more than 20 departments. We now have over 100.

5. Providing that all judges will be appointed by the governor instead of running for office, and then after two years having the judges "run against their records" without opposition.

6. No limit in size of legislature.

7. Apportionment of senators and representatives and decision as to whether population will be the only determining factor.

8. Removal of the death penalty for murder from the Constitution.

9. Giving the Supreme Court power to make rules of criminal and civil procedure. Some lawyers feel this will exceed "procedure" and that the Supreme Court will be making substantive laws in effect.

Counsel Appointed in Cases

10. Right to appointed counsel in all cases, including traffic violations, where incarceration may result. Cities and counties to pay the cost of attorneys for every case where defendant is broke.

11. Allowing the Supreme Court to declare laws unconstitutional because they violate "substantive due process." At present, the courts can reverse or declare laws unconstitutional for procedural reasons.

If these controversial features, which I shall discuss later, are eliminated and submitted later on a piece-meal basis, there is little chance that the people will vote on the proposed new Constitution. Our committees are now working toward elimination of as many controversial subjects as possible, which means that the document submitted to the people—if at all—will make no change from the present in the disputed areas.
