The search continued into the ninth day for Delford Sharpe, 19, Gayway Junction youth who has been missing in the mountainous area near Silver City, Idaho since Easter Sunday.

Young Sharpe was reported missing April 15 when he failed to show up for work Monday morning. It was later learned that he, with his father and mother, were on a hunting expedition into the Silver City area when their car became stalled during a snowstorm Sunday, near the ghost mining town.

Penrod Urges Care In Handling Pipe Near Power Lines

"Power lines may be overhead; look up before standing pipe on end!"

This advice to irrigators on the safe handling of sprinkler pipe was given Wednesday by Paul Penrod, Nyssa manager for Idaho Power company.

"Every year at the start of the irrigating season, we get reports of accidents or near-accidents resulting from careless handling of pipe near overhead power lines," Penrod said.

Only recently the manager reported, two farm laborers tipped up a section of pipe to shake sand out of it and the pipe struck a power line.

"Fortunately, the men escaped serious injury," he said. "Next time, they might not be so lucky."

Penrod urged everyone handling irrigation pipe to heed two basic rules recommended by A. I. Sawyer, Idaho Power safety director:

1. Stack pipe a safe distance away from power lines.
2. Don't gamble on clearing nearby power lines if you have to raise a pipe; move well away from the lines first.

NHS Bulldog Receives Tuberculosis Press Awards for Sixth Straight Year

A no-host dinner preceded the annual meeting of Malheur County Tuberculosis and Health association at Moore hotel Tuesday evening, April 16. New officers elected to head the association for the 1963-64 year are Steve Cox, president; Jack Blind, first vice president; the Rev. Miner Linwood, second vice president; Mrs. Mabel Shaw, secretary; and Norman Potratz, treasurer.

Jack Blind presented the school press project awards to the Nyssa high school paper, the Bulldog. Accepting both state and national certificates for superior journalism in reporting on community problems concerning tuberculosis and health was Miss Jeanie Seuell, managing editor of the paper.

Clyde Swisher is adviser and is given credit for the school's participation in this project. The Bulldog staff has won these awards for six consecutive years.

Statistical Report Given

Dr. E. S. Wainwright presented a statistical report on tuberculosis cases and case-finding in the county. The Malheur County Health department is the official agency which carries out this work. As a voluntary health organization, the Tuberculosis and Health association provides money from Christmas Seals to aid in buying equipment for skin testing and pays for x-rays for which the county does not provide tax dollars.

In 1962, 1688 skin tests were

given, with 41 positive reactors. The mobile unit x-rayed 3299 persons. Follow-up of positive reactors to find the source of infection in order to break the chain of infection takes persistence and time. Four new cases of tuberculosis were found in the county during the year, three of which were hospitalized.

Respiratory Diseases Discussed

Dr. Lester Scott was main speaker. He gave a talk on respiratory diseases, first describing and illustrating how lungs work. Bronchitis and emphysema are the most rapidly developing respiratory diseases in this age of air pollution and smoking.

Emphysema is a disease characterized by over-expanded lung tissue and can be a result of asthma, chronic bronchitis or of a chronic cough most frequently brought on by long-time heavy smoking.

Dr. Scott pointed out that if smoking causes coughing, then the smoker should stop. An informal discussion followed his talk.

City, Local School, Junior College And Hospital Tax Elections Starting April 26 All Require Voter Approval

Most Issues Will Be Determined on May 6 With District School Director to Be Chosen

Elections, starting tomorrow (Friday) April 26, appear to be the most important events looming on the horizon through May 24. They involve expenditures of money outside the six percent limitation or the election of personnel who will be setting policy for coming years.

First, Nyssa voters will be given an opportunity Friday to decide if they wish to continue a \$13,000 annual levy on city property for the maintenance of city streets. This tax is presently on the books and if approved will be for each of five more years. In addition to maintenance it covers the cost of sweeping, cleaning, purchase and repairs of street equipment. Voting will be at the city hall between the hours of 9 a.m. and 7 p.m.

School Election May 6

Second election for local voters will be to pass on school funds outside the six percent limitation and for one director for a five-year term.

They will be submitted a figure of \$116,575 outside the six percent limitation for consideration. Victor Haburchak and Raymond G. Larson (incumbent) are seeking the director spot. Date is Monday, May 6; hours are from 2 to 8 p.m. Polling place is the little theater in the high school building.

At the same time voters will pass on \$29,741.50 outside the legal limitation in the Rural School district of Malheur county and on a one-mill levy for the next three years for Treasure Valley Community college. The latter would produce approximately \$43,000 each year and would be held in readiness as building funds when the state makes its funds available. (Local funds are set at 25 percent and state at 75 percent.)

Adrian Voter Issues

Adrian school patrons will be asked to approve \$161,406.78 outside the six percent limitation. Those voters in zone 3 (north of Owyhee river to the Nyssa district) will vote for a director for a five-year term. Calvin Martin, incumbent, is unopposed for this position.

A director for zone 5 of Malheur county Rural School district will be voted upon at the same election. K. I. Peterson, Adrian, is unopposed for this position.

The Adrian election will be held in the grade school building May 6 from 2 to 8 p.m.

Hospital Election May 24

The Malheur Memorial hospital election will be held May 24 to pass on the amount in excess of the six percent limitation. The present budget shows \$22,000 but budget hearing will not be held until May 14 and any corrected figure will show in a future election notice.

Senator A. Yturri Sees Continuation Of Legislative Session Past May 10

The estimate of the president of the Senate that we might adjourn on April 30 has been revised. It now appears that the earliest possible adjournment will not be prior to May 10, if then.

The House will no doubt pass and send to the Senate today a tax "package" regarding income taxes. The proposed plan is a diversion from that of the

governor, Senator Musa, Representative Mosser or any other plan that has been heretofore submitted. However, if enacted, it will have an aspect of the "net receipts" taxation.

It proposes that the first \$16,000 of net income from any source and without deduction or exemption, be taxed at one percent, and that net income over \$16,000 be taxed at 1½ percent. Then, in addition, it will provide for taxation on the same income on a graduated basis ranging from two to six percent. All existing deductions, except federal income tax, will be retained. This will produce at least \$35 million.

Senate May Not Accept Plan

There is some doubt as to whether the Senate will accept the House proposal. Presently, there is talk to the effect that the Senate prefers the Musa plan which, simply stated, will reduce personal exemptions and dependency deductions from \$600 to \$500.

In addition, it will have rates ranging from two to six percent; eliminate the federal income tax deduction; retain all other exemptions, but provide that anyone not required to pay a tax but who files a return, will pay from \$5 to \$10 minimum tax, depending upon whether the taxpayer is single or married.

900 Migrants Here For Beet Thinning As More Expected

Of the approximately 1400 migrant laborers recruited by the Amalgamated Sugar company to be used in beet thinning operations, 900 have arrived in the county.

Approximately 300 are in the Nyssa labor camp with the other 600 being divided among the labor camps at Adrian, Vale and Ontario.

Henry Zobel, manager of Amalgamated's Nyssa district, said beets were slower than common this year due to rain, snow and cold weather and that it would be about May 1 before any fields would be ready for thinning.

He said that the original estimate of 1 percent loss due to freezing and blowing winds made a week ago was correct then but since with more cold weather and hard packing rains the figure now was about 10 percent or 3500 acres that would possibly have to be replanted.

In the lighter soil areas farmers are busy now replanting and in some cases are breaking up the top crust in hopes that plants will still come through.

Most of the migrants are unemployed at the present time and the 500 yet to arrive will probably be here before there is work for all, Zobel said.

May 7 Is Date Slated As Pre-School Day For Adrian Children

Pre-school day will be May 7 at Adrian grade school for all children who will be first graders next year, according to Bob Patterson, grade school principal.

A meeting for parents of pre-schoolers will be held at 9 a.m. in the recreation room of the grade school, Patterson said. Mrs. Edna Blaylock, county health nurse, will be present to explain to parents about the goldenrod physical examination which is necessary for all pupils to take before entering the first grade. A general discussion on children will follow.

First grade students will not attend school that day, Tuesday, May 7, as pre-school children will be in the first grade classrooms.

Looney Donates Land For Angling Purposes At Adrian Location

Through the generosity of Bill Looney of Adrian, a new access site will be developed for Snake river anglers, according to a bulletin from the Oregon State Game commission. Looney recently made an outright gift of around one-half an acre of land bordering the river in the east part of Adrian to the game commission to be developed for angling purposes.

According to the game commission release, upon hearing of the gift, Malheur county expressed interest in the site and offered boat refund money from the boaters' licensing tax for development purposes.

The cooperative venture by the game commission and Malheur county will result in the development of a boat ramp and parking area for anglers, the bulletin stated.
