W. Ellis Walters Services Conducted Saturday Afternoon

Funeral services for William Ellis Walters, a resident of the Nyssa area for 52 years, were conducted Saturday afternoon at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating minister was the Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa Methodist church.

Mr. Walters succumbed Wednesday, April 17, 1963, in Malheur Memorial hospital following an extended illness.

He was born May 23, 1882, at Berryville, Ark., a son of Franklin T. "Doc" and Roberta Carter Walters. He grew up and attended school near Berryville.

On June 15, 1910, in Harrison, Ark., he was united in marriage to Ida Farmer and to this union four sons were born, three of whom survive. One son, Robert, died at the age of 21 in 1935.

The Walters' came to the Nyssa area in March 1911 where they had since resided. Mr. Walters was a retired farmer and was also a ditch rider on the Owyhee project for 23 years. He worked 12 campaigns at Amalgamated Sugar factory, until he retired in 1958 due to ill health. The couple moved to the present residence in Nyssa in September 1959 from their home at Owyhee corners.

Mr. Walters was at one time a member of Odd Fellows and Masonic lodges. On June 19, 1960, the couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary with an open house reception given in their home by their children.

In addition to his widow of the home, Mr. Walters is survived by three sons, Rex of Boise, Byrd and Jack of Nyssa; one granddaughter, Mrs. Brenda Launt of Caldwell; and one great-granddaughter, Deborah Launt.

Other survivors include one brother, Charles F. of Walla Walla, Wash.; three sisters, Mrs. Lydia Callen of Murtaugh, Idaho, Mrs. Florence Boatright and Mrs. Byrd King of Berryville.

His parents; a brother, Dan; and two sisters, Mrs. Dora Bunch and Mrs. Myrtle Boatright, preceded him in death.

Interment services were conducted at Owyhee cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home. Active pallbearers were Don Linville, Bob Thompson, Earl Kygar, Vernon Parker, Claude Skinner and Herschel Thompson. Honorary bearers included Art Boydell, Ray Franklin, Joe Bellon, Al Thompson, Audrey Ward and Tom Johnson.

"This drama re-humanizes these characters; stripping them of two thousand years of tradition and literary clichés and in this way reveals insights into the 'treachery' of Judas and the beauty of forgiveness."
