If the bunch of letters do not go to the same place, they put it on the front. Then the man will be sure to separate it again.

Next he took us to a place where one side has lots of wooden boxes with Rural Route 1 and Rural Route 2. After a while he showed us parcel post. It looks like a bed. Then he showed us the money order. It is a card with lots of numbers. Some numbers were punched out.

Then Mr. Wohlcke said that the letters that have no address or something go to the dead letter post office, and that no letter smaller than 3" x 4 1/4" may be mailed.

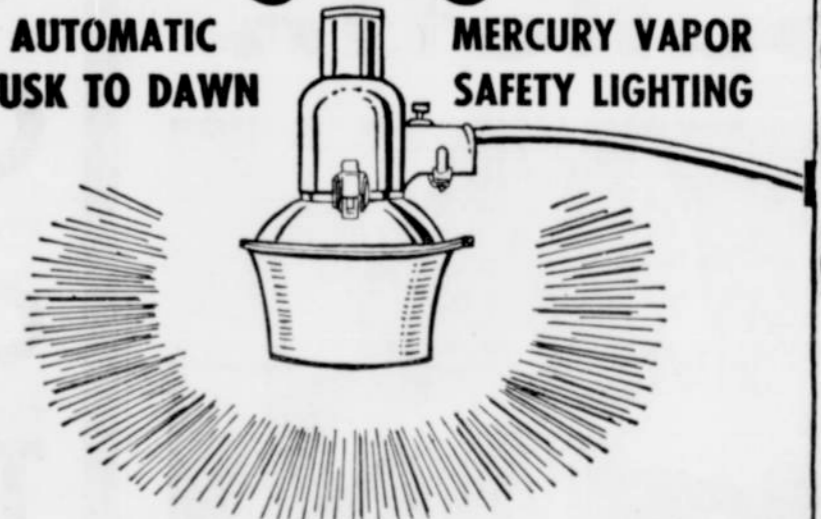
