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Ellis White Attends National Juvenile Meet in California

Judge Ellis White left April 27 for Tahoe City, Calif., to attend the National Council of Juvenile Court Judges six-day institute for a selected group of judges from western states who exercise juvenile or family court jurisdiction.

This meeting is the fifth institute of this kind but the first one to involve judges from this area. It is made possible by a three-year grant from National Institute of Mental Health, U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

All costs of Judge White's attendance are being paid by the institute except for a registration fee.

Special attention will be given to the basic human relations and communications skills so important for effective judicial performance—whether applied in the handling and disposition of cases, leadership of the court staff team or meaningful work with community groups and resources. This will be done through discussion and conference techniques which have proven highly successful across the country with other professional groups.

Heritance Players to Present Drama Saturday Evening at Christian Church

Featured artists with the Heritance Players who will present the drama "Rehearsal in Kerioth" at 8 o'clock Saturday evening, May 4, at the Nyssa Christian church will include Carolyn Bartell, Steven Williams, Ronald Coulter and Jeannine Kay.

Carolyn Bartell is known as an exceptional actress who has been with the troupe since its inception. Many consider her one of the outstanding actresses from the northwest. Her home is Tacoma, Wash.

Steven Williams of Seattle is studying broadcasting at the University of Oregon in Eugene and toured with last year's production of "Le Comedien."

Ronald Coulter of Eugene is director of the group and will also be acting. He is a graduate of the University of Oregon in speech and theater and is a special drama instructor at Northwest Christian college in Eugene. He recently toured the Orient in State department and USO performances.

Jeannine Kay, also of Eugene, is the program coordinator and operates the complex lighting and sound systems.

The Heritance Players, formerly the Christian Drama Troupe, were originally sponsored by Northwest Christian college but are now an independent non-profit organization.

The drama, "Rehearsal in Kerioth," is the story of a modern young actor and actress who are unsympathetically rehearsing the roles of Judas Iscariot and Mary of Magdala. During rehearsal they begin improvising scenes from the passion of Christ and the characterizations take control of them.

In their imagination they become the characters. In this strange way Judas is presented as a modern man and attempts to justify his betrayal in several different ways.

The Rev. Wallace Prowell, pastor of the local Christian church, issues an invitation to all area residents to see this drama as it re-humanizes these characters, stripping them of two thousand years of tradition and literary cliches and in this way reveals unique insights into the "treachery" of Judas and the beauty of forgiveness.

The Rosary was recited for Regino Montoya on Sunday evening, April 28, 1963, at Peckham-Dakam-Davis chapel in Caldwell and requiem mass was repeated Monday morning at St. Mary's Catholic church in Caldwell.

Mr. Montoya, retired stockman and miner, succumbed in a Caldwell nursing home following an extended illness.

He was born Sept. 7, 1887, in Alava, Spain, and arrived in Owyhee county from that country on Feb. 23, 1907. He worked in the mines at De Lamar and lived in the De Lamar-Silver City-Jordan Valley area until he moved to Adrian in 1920.

He was united in marriage in 1923 to Georgia Mendiola in Vale. The deceased was a member of the Catholic church.

Mr. Montoya had operated a stock ranch until ill health forced his retirement approximately two years ago.

In addition to his widow, survivors include two brothers-in-law, Joe Mendiola of Vale and Angel Mendiola of Winnemucca, Nev.; a sister-in-law, Mrs. Vincente Mendiola of Ontario.

Rev. Fr. John Casby of Caldwell officiated at the services. Burial was made in St. John's cemetery at Ontario.
