May 20 Deadline Set for Appealing Tax Assessments

Oregon property taxpayers have until Monday, May 20, to appeal this year's assessments to their county boards of equalization.

Each county board will convene on Monday, May 13, for its annual review of assessments and, under Oregon law, a property owner may appear in person or be represented by an attorney before the board when it considers petitions for reduction of assessments.

Taxpayers cannot wait until receiving their tax statements in the fall to appeal their assessments. If they do not know the assessed value of their property at this time, they can learn it at the county assessor's office. By multiplying the assessed value by four, they can determine the true cash (market) value.

If a taxpayer feels the assessor's market value is out of line with comparable properties in the district, he may appeal by petition to the county board of equalization. Forms for this purpose are available in most assessor's offices or at the county clerk's office.

From the board the taxpayer may appeal to the State Tax Commission (or, in the case of real property, directly to the Oregon Tax Court's Small Claims division if the market value as determined by the board is not more than \$25,000).

Increase Noted In 1962 Payment To Beet Growers

Amalgamated Sugar company made an additional sugar beet payment of \$2,207,400 Tuesday on the 1962 crop to farmers in Utah, Idaho and Eastern Oregon, according to A. E. Benning, company president.

Amalgamated made an initial payment of \$25,433,000 to its growers last fall and they will receive a final payment next October after sugar production from the 1962 crop has been sold. Tuesday's payment was distributed as follows: Utah district (including Ogden, Lewiston and Franklin county division), \$143,500; Idaho district (including Twin Falls, Jerome, Burley and Rupert areas), \$998,000; and Nampa-Nyssa district, \$1,065,900.

Benning reports in a letter accompanying the beet payment checks that the additional payment is from 50 to 100 percent over that of a year ago, which reflects a stronger sugar market and in the Idaho district a higher sugar content.

He also said that the 1963 spring has been somewhat late, but with the recent improvement of the irrigation water outlook, a good crop year should result for sugar beet growers. At the end of last week approximately 125,000 acres of beets had been planted in the company's territory.

M. Cottrell Named Assistant Postmaster

Official appointment for Melvin Cottrell as assistant postmaster at Nyssa was signed April 30 by James J. Symbol, regional manager. Cottrell received official notification of the permanent appointment last Thursday.

He was born in Burlington, Wyo., Aug. 22, 1922, and was graduated from high school there. He attended Wyoming university before joining the Army to serve during World War II for three years.

After his service, he married and moved to Oregon where he began his post office duties Aug. 28, 1948.

Group to Present Watershed Report For Succor Creek

At the request of ranchers on Succor creek, the Oregon Watershed Planning party has completed an investigation of this watershed, according to John W. Berg, Adrian SCD conservationist. A report is to be presented by Bill Coffield, head of the planning party, at 8 p.m. Wednesday, May 15, at Ridgeview school.

The major problem of Succor creek watershed is the erratic flow of the creek and its tributaries which varies from severe flooding in later winter or early spring to a very low flow during the rest of the year. The full productive potential of the land in this watershed cannot be realized until the erratic flow with the accompanying floods can be controlled.

A program of reservoir development, irrigation reorganization, channel improvement and drainage could do much to correct the damaging effect of floods, provide a full season irrigation water supply and improve the water management.

Solving the water problems on Succor creek would contribute to the economy of Malheur county, Berg said. All persons or groups involved in water management of this area are invited to attend and participate at this meeting.

Nyssa School Voters Approve Budget Totaling \$719,223 by 331 to 219 Margin; \$58,090 Higher Than Last Year's Levy

Raymond G. Larson Re-elected to Board In 277 to 268 Victory Over Victor Haburchak

The Nyssa School District 26 budget of \$719,223, which exceeded the six percent limitation by \$116,575, was passed by voters Monday, May 6. Of the total 568 votes cast, there were 331 yes votes as opposed to 219 no votes, according to Dirick Nedry, district clerk - business manager.

The original budget, prior to budget hearing April 16, was approved and adopted at a meeting of the budget board and called for total estimated expenditures of \$712,923 or \$51,790 above last year's budget.

At a public hearing April 16 an additional \$6000 was added for an assistant music director and \$300 for the journalism department, making a total of \$719,223.

In a close ballot for school director Raymond G. Larson was re-elected to a five-year term with 277 votes as against 268 ballots for Victor R. Haburchak. One write-in vote was cast for John Olsen.

Additions to Budget Listed

Major changes in the budget were under instruction, where there was an increase of \$27,318; transportation, raised \$7,100; and operation of plant, with an increase of \$2,891.

Other areas where there were considerable changes were under food services, but was an offsetting income item paid by student lunch fees; and debt service, which reflects the interest which must be paid on the bonds voted for the new construction of the vocational agriculture building and biology laboratory.

In summary, the reasons for increasing the tax levy were: Insufficient tax base to operate necessary school program, to hire two additional teachers, to purchase one additional school bus, and to make necessary improvements and repairs on buildings and grounds.

Jaycees to Donate Money for Bleachers

Nyssa Jaycees held a regular session Monday evening at which time they approved plans for the year. The budget was also approved with the exception of an appropriation for the flag project.

Dick Wilson was present and talked to the group about the "Baseball for Kids" program. The Jaycees voted to donate money for the purchase of bleachers to be used for Little league games.

Harold Brendle was guest speaker and gave a brief description of Nyssa as it looked several years ago. He also told about carpets, including what to look for when purchasing a carpet, quality and types.

Next Jaycee board meeting will be Tuesday evening, May 14, at the home of one of the members.

State Legislators Spend Many Hours On Proposed New Oregon Constitution

The proposed new Constitution, House Joint Resolution 1, has been approved by the House Constitutional Revision committee and was scheduled to be voted on by the House of Representatives on Monday, May 6. Both the House and Senate committees have spent many hours in reviewing and amending the document prepared by the Constitutional Revision commission.

This commission consisted of 18 people who were appointed to this task as a result of Senate Joint Resolution 20, adopted by the 51st Oregon Legislative Assembly in 1961. The new Constitution, if adopted by both Houses by a two-thirds majority and approved by the majority of the people at the primary election in 1964, will go into effect Jan. 1, 1967.

Controversial Change Noted

Probably the most striking and controversial change from the original many - times - amended century-old document is the provision that eliminates the election of three state-wide officers. Current elective officers made appointive under the new Constitution include the attorney general, state treasurer and labor commissioner.

The governor, who is the only state-wide elective officer other than the secretary of state, will appoint the heads of the executive departments, subject to confirmation.

Everyone is encouraged to make use of this free service because many cases of tuberculosis could be cured if found early.

Nyssa visitations are scheduled in front of the Idaho Power office from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 4 to 6 p.m. The unit will be at the labor camp May 15 between the hours of 4 and 9 p.m.

Seven Points Listed

These are seven points everyone needs to know about TB:

1. Tuberculosis is contagious.
2. TB is caused by a germ.
3. You cannot inherit TB from your parents.
4. You can have TB without feeling sick.
5. The doctor can tell whether or not you have TB by x-rays and other tests.
6. TB usually can be cured if found early enough and treated properly.
7. The TB hospital is the best place to go to be treated and to protect others from your germs.

This chest x-ray unit is another phase of the TB campaign. Malheur county's most active participant in this project has been the Nyssa high school newspaper, the Bulldog, whose TB project has received state and national press project awards for an outstanding job on reporting on community problems concerning tuberculosis and health.

Senate Bill 179 has passed the Senate. This provides that every installment sale contract of personal property must recite in bold figures thereon the amount of interest rate or dollar cost of service that the buyer will be required to pay.
