caused this committee to believe that there are too many purchasers who are not aware of the true interest charges they are paying or the cost of the insurance discount and other services that are frequently added to contracts for purchase of appliances, cars and other such items.

Inventory Tax Relief Given

House Bill 1033 has passed the House and is now in the Senate. This bill relieves inventory and personal property taxpayers of one-fourth of the tax load. The money lost by this relief will be replaced by a tax of one percent upon business and professional men. Corporate employees will be exempt from the one percent tax.

Many legislators complain that this bill will permit college presidents and professors, as well as presidents and high officials of power companies and other corporations to escape the tax, while it will be imposed upon professional men, members of partnerships and all self-employed persons.

By action of the House Democrats, the proposition of submitting a sales tax with property tax offsets to the people for their vote has been killed. The bill was "indefinitely postponed" this week in the House, which means its death at this session.

Daylight Saving Time

Senate Bill 300 has passed and will become law if signed by the governor or if permitted to become law without his signature. This will provide daylight saving time for all of Oregon from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October.

Malheur county is not affected since the bill applies only to areas of the state presently on Pacific Standard Time. This law will cause California, Oregon, Washington and Idaho to be on the same time during these six months of the year.

Bank Deposits Bill Buried

House Bill 1177 which would permit the state, cities, counties and political subdivisions to deposit funds in each branch of a national bank as though each branch was an independent bank, is buried in the State and Federal Affairs committee of the Senate.

A hearing has been set for May 16 but there is danger that delay may result in death of the bill. This would cause serious damage to the towns which have only branches of national banks, although it would be a boon to independent banks in any city.

"This House Had Windows" by David Scott Blackhall. An honest account of the blindness that befell him, at the age of 46, by a London civil servant and poet.

"Here to Stay" by John Hersey. The author's belief in the indomitability of man's spirit is revealed in his telling of eight stories of people who managed to survive forces which almost destroyed them.

"But Not Next Door" by Harry Rosen. A report on the events in Deerfield, Ill., when the Progress Development corporation began to build 51 homes, 10 or 12 of which were to be sold to Negroes. This social study reveals a cross-section of prejudice and perplexity mixed with idealism.

"Forever Free" by Joy Adamson. This is the successor to "Born Free" and "Living Free" stories of the raising of lioness Elsa by the author and her husband and of Elsa's cubs.

"The Politics of African Nationalism" by George W. Shepherd. A member of the American Committee on Africa offers an introduction to African nationalism addressed to thoughtful readers and based on acquaintance with leaders, on research and on travel.

"You Ought to Patent That" by Stacy V. Jones. A practical guide for the amateur and professional, to patents and inventions.

"The Scent of Roses" by Aleen Leslie. This novel is the story of one year in Jane Carlyle's life, when at the age of 10 she became a part of Weber household in Pittsburgh in 1908.

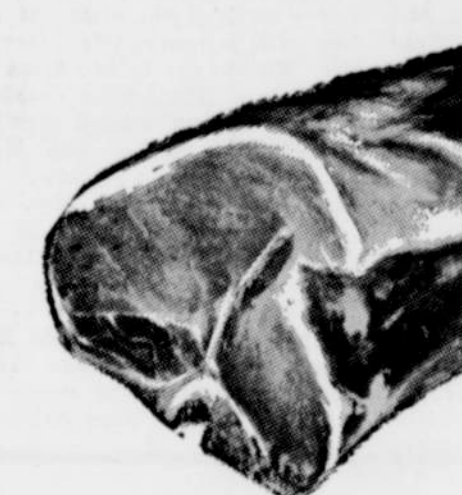
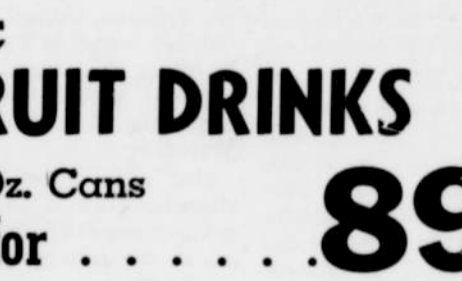

Potato Group Holds Marketing Discussion

The Idaho and Eastern Oregon Potato Marketing committee met May 2 in Pocatello to discuss the potato marketing order. The committee turned down by a vote of 5 to 3 a motion to hold a hearing with the secretary of agriculture for the purpose of adding two more shippers to the committee.

The control committee now consists of three shippers and five growers. The proposed amendment which was defeated would have given potato shippers equal representation with the growers on the committee.
