

### Vale Eliminates Nyssa From Play

In a game tied up 5 to 5 in the sixth and seventh innings, Vale shoved across the winning run in their half of the eighth, thus ending the Bulldogs' chance for a play in the 2-A playoff.

After a disastrous first inning Les Mayden, pitching for the Bulldogs, settled down to do a good job of retiring the Vikings until the eighth frame.

Three Vale hits and three Nyssa errors allowed four Vale runs to cross the plate in the first inning.

Nyssa's big inning came in the fourth. John Beck started it with a single, Mike McGinnis got a walk and Jim Benedict followed with a hit. Mayden got a walk, Gene Jones got a hit and Francis McCrady followed with a single. Coupled with two Vale errors, when the dust settled, Nyssa was out front 5-4.

In the sixth inning Vale scored the tying run with a walk, a sacrifice and a hit.

The winners got six hits off Mayden, while Nyssa garnered seven hits. Nyssa committed five errors to six on the Vale club.

### Bulldog Nine Finally Takes Win From Vale

Playing a post season game against the Vale Vikings May 10, the cohorts of Coach Jack Bowen lowered the boom on the boys from the county seat by a score of 4 to 1.

Nyssa's runs came on six hits plus two Vale errors. Mike Kodama faced 15 batters and allowed no hits. Tommy Moore came on in the fifth, gave up four hits and one run.

Steve Kerby pitched the Bulldogs to a two-run win over Meridian Friday, May 8, on the Idaho diamond. Both teams garnered three hits but Meridian picked up one more error than did the Bulldogs. It was a shut-out for Kerby as the Warriors were blanked.

In the third inning Kerby got to first on a walk. Gerald Wyckoff slammed out a single and Kerby scored on an error. John Beck then got a hit, scoring Wyckoff for Nyssa—two counters.

ballots would not arrive in time to be used.

Article 8, section 6, of the state constitution reads as follows: "In all school district elections every citizen of the United States of the age of 21 years and upward who shall have resided in the school district during the preceding six months immediately preceding such election, and who shall be duly registered prior to such election in the manner provided by law, shall be entitled to vote, provided such citizen is able to read and write the English language."

#### Board Approves Vote

The college directors approved the results after having noted the shortage of ballots in the Nyssa precinct. They reasoned that had all the 89 been opposed to the issue it would still have passed by two votes. Certified returns showed 1022 for the issue and 931 against.

College President Eugene Voris was quoted in the May 13 issue of the Ontario paper as saying, "It is regrettable that the ballot shortage happened. We'll see that it doesn't occur again."
