Agriculture Department Lists Wage Requirements for '63 Sugar Beet Crop

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced the fair and reasonable wage requirements for the 1963 crop of sugar beets in all producing regions.

The determination announced increases in minimum time rates of 10 cents per hour—from 95 cents to \$1.05 per hour—and increased piecework rates on the average of about 10 percent. Piecework rates range by wage districts from \$10.00 to \$10.50 per acre for hoeing, \$12.00 to \$12.50 per acre for hoe trimming, \$17.00 to \$17.50 per acre for blocking and thinning and \$6 to \$8 per acre for weeding.

All other provisions are the same as those of the 1962 crop determination.

USDA said the wage rates established by the determination are within the producers' ability to pay under prospective price and production conditions for the 1963 crop. Prevailing wages in most of the wage districts in recent years have generally exceeded the determination rates.

Payment of wages not less than those set by the secretary of agriculture is a requirement that producers must meet to qualify for payments under the Sugar Act of 1948 as amended.

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
