

### Seniors Gain Win In Pep Cup Race With 82-Point Sum

With a total of 82 points, the senior class won the race for the Pep Cup. In second place were the sophomores with 69 points. Following closely behind were the juniors with 67 points. The freshmen placed fourth with 46 points.

ICRC Karen Saito commented, "Seniors were in the lead for the majority of the year with the sophomores giving them close competition. Each class should be given much credit for their help in participation."

Pep Cup points are tallied on a percentage basis for attendance and participation by each of the classes in school activities. Attendance at football and basketball games, school-sponsored dances and student body elections give classes points of 5, 3 and 1. Competition yeils along with parent attendance at PTA earn the classes points of 2 and 1.

Points were also deducted for classes which did not follow the "Seniors First" tradition.
