### Swimmers, Boaters Given Safety Rules

An estimated 6550 people will drown this year in the United States—some 2550 from swimming or playing in the water alone. An additional 4000 will fall from docks, bridges or drown within 75 feet of shore.

Most of the individuals who become part of these dismal statistics will do so because they fail to observe 10 simple rules around water, according to Edward J. Slezak, associate professor in physical education and recreation at Oregon State university.

To live longer while enjoying water sports, everyone should observe the following rules, says Slezak.

1. Learn to Swim.
2. Never swim alone.
3. Refrain from swimming too soon after meals.
4. Enter the water gradually—never turn your back to surf waters.
5. Swim only when lifeguards are on duty.
6. Never call for help unless needed.
7. Listen to instructions.
8. Observe all beach and pool regulations.
9. Have a boat and two good swimmers escort you on long swims.
10. Never overload boats, canoes, and wear life jackets.

Mr. McGinnis was born Feb. 22, 1891, in Susanville, Calif., a son of Jim and Jane Cantrell McGinnis. He attended schools in Modoc county, Calif.

He came to the Owyhee community in 1912 and was united in marriage to Charlotte Smith on Dec. 18 that year. The McGinnis couple celebrated their golden wedding anniversary on Dec. 18, 1962.

The deceased farmed for a number of years. In 1940 the couple moved to Adrian where he had worked at the carpentry trade.

In addition to his widow of the home, Mr. McGinnis is survived by one son, James of Adrian; one daughter, Mrs. Rose Willis of Adrian; four grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Services were conducted at 10:30 Saturday morning, June 1, 1963, at Lienkaemper chapel in Nyssa with the Rev. Eldon Hunter of Wilder officiating. Music was furnished by Howard Larsen.

### 'Wise Shoppers Check Credit Plan, Charges,' Says Extension Specialist

If you pride yourself on being a real bargain hunter, use the same resourcefulness when it comes to shopping for credit. Credit charges may range all the way from "nothing" to 18 percent a year.

Mrs. Alberta Johnston, Oregon State university extension specialist, says many department stores now offer credit services unknown a few years ago. With the various types of credit and accounts available, it's the wise shopper who finds out which one fits her family's pocketbook.

Under an open account, the customer is able to buy whatever he needs, sign a sales slip to signify intention to pay, with no down payment required. Usually an open account carries no interest or credit charge.

Revolving charge accounts, those with payments scheduled on the installment plan, have also become popular.

Continuous Purchasing Power Mrs. Johnston describes how they work: When a customer applies to open a revolving charge account, she agrees to pay a certain amount of money each month on purchases from the store. The minimum payment each month is about \$10 and the maximum set by the store. The store then sets a credit limit for the customer, equal to 12 times the selected monthly payments. In this way, the customer has continuous purchasing power.

For example, if a customer decides to pay \$10 a month, she has \$120 worth of credit and may buy \$120 worth of merchandise. At the end of the month, she is billed for \$10 if the charge against her is between \$10 and \$120. When this bill is paid, she may buy enough more goods to bring the balance back up to \$120. Because this can go on indefinitely, it's been called a "financial merry-go-round."

Service Charge Made If the store makes a service charge of 1 1/2 percent per month on the unpaid balance, the customer with a debt of \$120 at the end of the month would owe a service charge of \$1.80 which would be added to the balance.

Revolving credit was designed for customers who couldn't pay for purchases of any considerable size within 30 days. Others who could use regular or open charge accounts prefer revolving accounts because they like the "budget" feature, says Mrs. Johnston.

Customers should be aware that cost in terms of annual interest charges may range between 12 and 18 percent. Stores like revolving credit because it increases business and streamlines their bookkeeping. Interest charges or service charges take care of the cost of servicing and carrying the accounts.
