## Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

Have you considered these minute slicers? Stash away dust catchers in your "S" (for sentiment) file and save cleaning. Use a bulletin board to remind others in the family how they can share responsibilities and work together. Replace worn clothing with the "no-iron" type whenever possible. Use range-to-table dishes such as casseroles, and appliances which do the cooking at the table.

Weiser, OSU Extension nutrition specialist, says these are safe to eat. Producers are required to stamp "color added" on artificial colored fruit. The Food and Drug administration keeps close tab on these food additives.

A few years ago, some colorings were banned and new ones substituted which have government approval.

### CONTROVERSY OVER FLAMMABILITY

... of Acrilan carpet has come to our attention. We checked reliable sources and find there's been some misinformation on the subject.

Acrilan is slow burning and no more of a fire hazard than cotton or rayon. The Civil Aeronautics authority which has rigid standards for materials used in planes, approved of Acrilan carpet and found it to be two to three times less flammable than their standard requirements. Fire prevention organizations have stated there is no fire hazard from normal use of this carpet.

The National Fire Protection association lists the really potential fire hazards in the home as curtains, bed sheets, faulty wiring and heating systems, combustible materials near exposed fires, faulty chimneys and cooking equipment. No mention is made of carpets.

### OILY SOIL IN NYLON

... has always been hard to get out. Research home economists at Ohio State university have found one type of bleach helps do the job. It's safe for all fabrics.

Chemically this is known as a mono-persulfate type. You can't buy it by that name but our new OSU Extension Service bulletin, "Be a Better Buyer of Bleaches," will give you the trade names for each of the three types of bleaches

### THE DULL, SMEARY LOOK ON FURNITURE

... may be due to the greasy film which accumulates from cooking and heating. To remove this, use a furniture wax which does a cleaning job too. Read the labels and you'll find several of these.

Clean only a small area at a time and rub hard to loosen the greasy dirt. Then wipe dry immediately, with a clean cloth, while moist and while the soil is loose.

Do not use wax and oil products interchangeably on furniture. They are not compatible, and tells how to use them.

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
