

### Special Awards Given to Top Winners In Contests, on Exhibits at 4-H Fair

The big event completing the 4-H club home economics year closed last Friday with the public style review and the presentation of special awards.

Kay Pobanz was named winner of the overall home economics award for the best all-around exhibit. This award, presented by John Tucke of the Malheur county Farm Bureau, was a spray-steam iron.

### Veterans' Loan Maximum Upped By Legislature

A bill to increase the maximum amounts available under the Oregon veterans' farm and home loan program was one of several major veterans' measures passed by the 1963 legislature, the Department of Veterans' Affairs reported this week.

Veterans' loan maximums were increased from \$13,500 to \$15,000 for homes and from \$30,000 to \$40,000 for farms. The new maximums take effect starting Sept. 2.

In two other measures, the legislature liberalized the dates of service for World War I veterans, thus making more of these ex-servicemen or their widows entitled to property tax exemptions, then gave them a special 10-day period starting Sept. 2 in which to apply to their county assessors for the 1963-64 exemption.

Proceeds of GI insurance policies were made exempt from inheritance taxation by passage of House Bill 1223. The new measure also makes it unlikely that a widow with several minor children will have to pay inheritance tax on the family's Social Security benefits or pension, by giving each person in the family the benefit of a \$10,000 exclusion in addition to the general \$15,000 exemption.

This measure was passed because several cases have come to light where a virtually penniless widow with six or more children has been required to pay a substantial inheritance tax on the projected Social Security benefits the family would receive in the coming years.

### State Traffic Toll Tops All Records First Five Months

Oregon drivers seem determined to set a new record in blood-letting this year and Gov. Mark Hatfield is calling for an all-out effort to reduce the toll.

The governor, noting that the state's five-month toll was higher than ever before, called the apparent disregard of sensible driving practices "nothing short of disgusting."

Maximum enforcement effort against traffic law violators must be exerted in the months ahead, the governor said. He called upon the public to participate in the Oregon Safety Shield program this summer by supporting enforcement actions against people who wantonly disregard the safety of other street and highway users.

"There is no room on Oregon highways," he said, "for those who want to play a motorized version of Russian roulette." Through the end of May, 197 people had been killed in Oregon traffic. For the comparable period in 1959, the year the state re-
