Range Inspection Planned June 20; Public Welcomed

A range rehabilitation tour through the Vale BLM district's Soldier Creek unit will be conducted June 20, leaving Jordan Valley at 9 a.m., according to George Bain, Malheur county extension agent.

The tour jointly sponsored by the Bureau of Land Management and Extension service will be conducted through areas that have been treated by chemical sagebrush removal, plowing and seeding, and seeding following sagebrush spraying. Water developments securing better distribution of livestock will be included in the itinerary. Stops will be made in areas treated several years ago and now in use, as well as more recent treatments including a spray operation last month.

Everyone interested in range rehabilitation is invited to join the tour, Bain said. They should come in vehicles with adequate clearance for field travel and bring a sack lunch.

Dee and Andrew Child arrived June 4 at the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Edison Child. They have been attending college at Utah State university in Logan.

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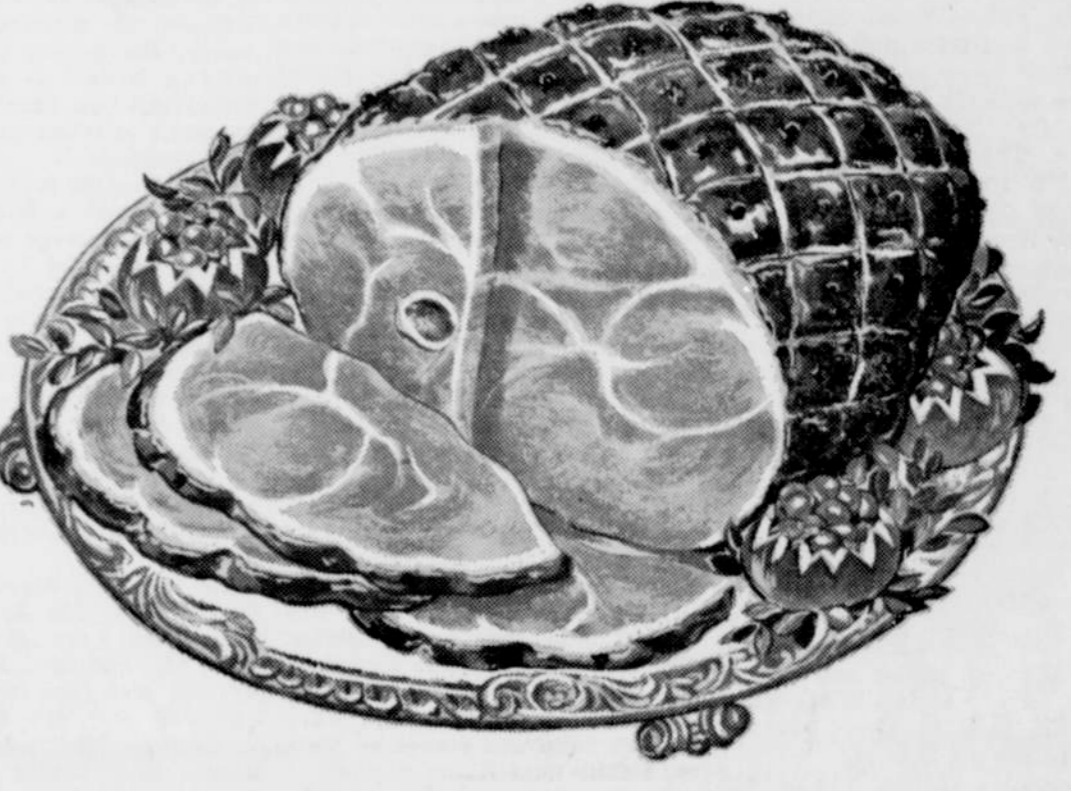

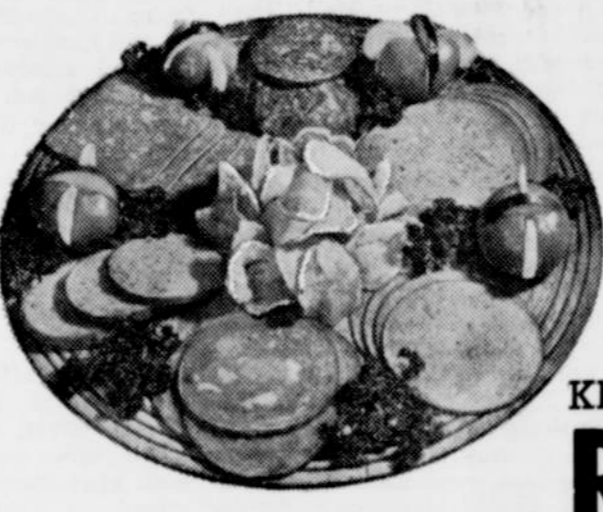
