Junior 4-H leaders from Malheur, Baker, Union, Wallowa and Umatilla counties are holding their annual campout today, Friday and Saturday, June 20-22. This year's event is at Camp Elkana near Starkey in Union county.

The camp has been extended this year to a three-day event and most of the program is being devoted to a workshop on camp counseling. Most of the counties plan to use junior leaders who complete the workshop as counselors at their regular 4-H camps later in the year.

Walt Schroeder, extension agent from Oregon State university is heading the camp counseling training. Assisting him will be extension agents from the various counties.

Over 20 4-H leaders from Malheur county are attending this event.

Plan for Financing Trip

Her numbers have decreased both nationwide and in the state, with the national figure this year down to 17.3 million, while the 1950-59 average was 20.6 million and Oregon at the first of this year showing a drop to 162,000 from 170,000 a year ago.

But the Bossies across the nation have united in their production effort and U.S. Department of Agriculture figures show their production increased 5.8 percent in 10 years, with the total this year expected to be 127 billion pounds.

July 20 has been set as tentative date for the formal opening.

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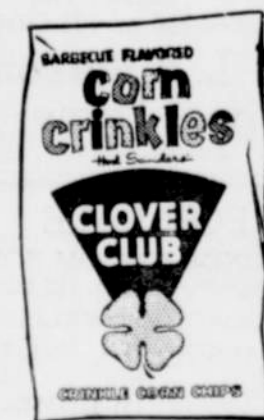
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
