

### Weiser's Music Week Ends Saturday Night With 8 O'Clock Finals

The neighboring town of Weiser is in the middle of celebrating its Annual National Oldtime Fiddlers' contest and Folk Music festival. The people of the town and community have united wholeheartedly on the program and have succeeded in getting wide recognition for their efforts.

A full week of activities is on the calendar. They have provided 10,000 seats for spectators in Memorial park and have contestants registered from all areas of the United States.

Tonight's (Thursday) program starts at 8 o'clock with National Junior contest (under 18), National Senior contest (over 70) and a regional contest for fiddlers at the community outdoor auditorium.

Friday at 9 a.m. fiddlers preliminaries will be held at the junior high gym. At 8 p.m. national semi-finals for fiddlers and folk singing will be at the outdoor auditorium.

Saturday's program starts at 9 a.m. with a fiddlers' breakfast at the Elks dining hall. At noon a luncheon will be held at the junior high cafeteria with Governor Robert Smylie and past champions as guests. At 1 p.m. centennial beards and dress will be judged at the American Legion hall (no charge for admission).

At 2 p.m. the festival parade can be seen on Main street and the final event climaxing the week-long festivities will start at 8 p.m. when finals of the fiddlers contest will be held. The winner will be adjudged the national fiddler champion.

Tickets are on sale at the Journal office in Nyssa or can be purchased at several locations in Weiser.

### Shortage of Sugar Raises Retail Prices

each month to get an average market, as it is impossible to out-guess the future market price.

Amalgamated's President A. E. Benning was quoted in the May 23 issue of the Wall Street Journal as saying, "I think prices will strengthen beyond what they are now and will continue to hold through at least September 1964."

Should this prediction be correct, local growers can expect to get a big increase in their payments on the 1962 and 1963 crops.

#### Past Prices Stable

Retail prices for granulated sugar have shown very slow increases since the establishment of the local factory in 1938. They remained in the 5-6 cent class until September 1946 when they reached 7 1/2 cents and went to 9 cents in October. They stayed near this level until 1951 when a 10-cent price was reached. This went to 11 cents in 1957 and has remained near that figure until the big jump this spring.

#### Present Crop Looks Good

Zobell said the beet thinning is done, the crop looks good and acreage is about the same as last year. He said the factory was able to handle 10 to 15 percent more than contracted this year and with the price situation being so favorable and the possibility of less wheat being planted he looks for acreage to move upward.
