

Pirates' Baseball Camp in Caldwell Friday, Saturday

The Pittsburgh Pirates of the National league will conduct a tryout camp at Caldwell Friday and Saturday, June 28-29. The camp will be held at Luby Field and will be under direction of Scout Ed "Babe" Barberis.

Players should report ready to go at 1 p.m. and workout until 4:30 p.m. Friday and from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Saturday.

Players should be 16 years of age to participate in the camp and American Legion players must have letters of approval from either their Legion coach or commander of the Legion post he represents in order that it does not interfere with their Legion programs.

Players are asked to furnish their own shoes, uniforms, gloves, etc., with the Pirates furnishing all other equipment. Players are also responsible for their traveling and living expenses, if any, with the understanding that all expenses will be reimbursed to those players signed to contracts with Pittsburgh organization clubs.

is an indoor shot of what is believed to be opening day of the saloon. Some of the men in the photo can be identified, while others cannot. There were no ladies present.

Another picture shows the building appearing much the same as it looks today except for the surroundings. In the old-time photo, there are no other buildings adjoining it. Large whiskey or beer kegs stand at its side and its front approach is graced with a large puddle of water instead of the sleek concrete railing now paralleling the underpass.

The old landmark will be missed by some, but also to many residents of the area it will be considered a good riddance as like all material things it served its purpose and has now become useless and merely an eyesore to those entering Nyssa from the east by way of the Union Pacific underpass on U.S. highways 20-26.
