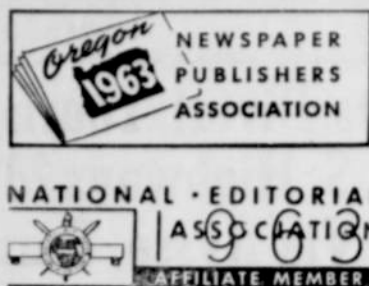

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Mrs. M. Barry, Mother
Of Nellie Wahlert,
Succumbs in Ashland

Mrs. May Barry, well-known pioneer matron of Merrill and mother of Mrs. W. K. (Nellie) Wahlert of Nyssa, succumbed June 19, 1963, in Ashland at the age of 87 years.

The deceased had been well and active until she suffered a stroke about three months ago, which made her an invalid. She was the widow of the late Michael Barry.

Recitation of the Holy Rosary was Friday, June 21, at O'Hair's Memorial chapel. Funeral services were conducted in the morning on the following day at Sacred Heart church, followed by interment in Mt. Calvary cemetery. She was a member of the Catholic church.

Mrs. Barry was born May O'Neil, June 20, 1876, a daughter of John and Nancy Jo Fitzgerald O'Neil at New Pine Creek. Her father came to this country with Crook's army and was stationed at Ft. Bidwell in California. Her mother taught the first school in Lakeview in 1873, in a one-room building with a dirt floor.

She was united in marriage to Michael Barry in Lakeview and the couple went to Merrill in 1918 to ranch and go into the sheep business. They resided on the home ranch until 1940 when Mr. Barry retired and they moved to the Ashland area. In addition to her husband, a son, Tone, also preceded Mrs. Barry in death.

Among survivors are three sons, John of Medford, Dan of Merrill and Emmett of Madras; five daughters, Mrs. Dan Cashman of Merrill, sister Rosetta (Order of St. Francis), Spokane, Mrs. Tom O'Brian of Oakland, Calif., Mrs. Etta Pair of Hollywood and Mrs. Wahlert of Nyssa.

Other survivors include a brother, John O'Neil of New Pine Creek; 17 grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Among the grandchildren is Mrs. Phyllis Quinowski of Nyssa.
