Announcement Made Of Increase in Fees For Milk Producers

Grade A milk producers in the state will find an additional one cent per hundredweight deducted from the milk checks they receive for milk delivered to handlers after the first of this month.

Oregon Department of Agriculture has issued an administrative order setting the deduction at 1½ cents per hundredweight effective July 1, 1963. The first handler of the milk is responsible to the department for the deduction.

The order was issued following a hearing June 24 in Salem. Producers of grade A milk have been paying one-half cent per hundredweight for support of the milk audit program, which is under the Oregon Department of Agriculture.

The increase of one cent will be used for increased support of the milk audit program and administration of the new Milk Stabilization act, administration of which was delegated to the Department of Agriculture by the legislature.
