Children Under 16 Limited on Motor Bike Use in State

Parents were warned this week that children under 16 should not be permitted to operate motor bikes on public streets and roads.

Since the motor bike is classified as a motor vehicle, the Department of Motor Vehicles said the same laws apply to its operation as those covering automobiles.

This means that motor bikes must be operated by a licensed driver at least 16 years of age. A 15-year-old who holds an instruction permit still would not be able to drive the two-wheeler because the law specifically excludes use of an instruction permit to operate a motorcycle.

The department said that the growing popularity of the motorized two-wheelers brought about a 60.7 percent increase in motorcycle registrations last year. Most of the increase is attributed to the motor bike.
