New books going into circulation Saturday, July 13, at Malheur county library include the following:

"Concord Rebel" by August Derleth. Account of the life of Henry David Thoreau.
"Great Britain Since 1688" by K. B. Smellie. The ideas, events and personalities, from William III to Harold Macmillan, that have shaped Britain.
"The Cape Cod Lighter" by John O'Hara. A collection of 23 short stories.

"When the Legends Die" by Hal Borland. A novel that tells the story of an Indian boy who was betrayed by both his own people and the white man and how he eventually regained his pride for his past heritage.
"The Tidal Water" by Barbara Walker. The story of a young English girl who learns of the existence of evil for the first time.

"After the Fine Weather" by Michael Gilbert. A novel of suspense.
"I Owe Russia \$1200" by Bob Hope. This is Bob Hope's account of his adventures around the world while entertaining servicemen from Alaska, Korea, Guam, Okinawa, etc., his TV show in Moscow and other activities including golf.

"The Doughboys" by Laurence Stallings. The story of the Doughboys of the American Expeditionary Force who went to France in 1917-18 to "make the world safe for democracy."
"Red Machete" by John Donovan. A comprehensive investigation of the methods and accomplishments of Communist infiltration in the Americas.

"The Betrayers" by Jonathan Rost. An objective assessment of the espionage case against Julius and Ethel Rosenberg.

"Behind the Veil of Arabia" by Jorgen Bisch. A colorful personal account of a Danish author's investigation of the slave trade in Saudi Arabia.
"The Bargain Hucksters" by Ralph Lee Smith. The inside story of how the bargain huckster dupes the unknowing consumer out of his money.

Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

"TOO OFTEN WE FIND OURSELVES IN A CONFLICT over whether to do the urgent or the important." Dr. June Bricker, executive director of American Home Economics association of Washington, D.C., made this comment on her recent Oregon visit.

And we'll grant you do have to do the urgent most of the time. But as Dr. Bricker said, we're inclined to side step some new and important issues because we're "too busy."

Sifting busy work out from the really important jobs is another way to work smarter, not harder. Having every inch of your house spick and span might be classed as "busy work" one day, but really important for some special occasion.

Actively working on a committee in support of better schools may be important for your children's future, while routine household chores seem urgent at the moment.

WHY DO CLOTHES WEAR OUT SO FAST? Tests show that a shirt can be washed 100 times without collar-fraying if it's not worn between washings. But if the shirt is worn a day in between each washing, the same kind of shirt starts to fray at the collar after about 35 washings. Body friction rather than washing action is responsible.

Looks like it's the wear part of wash and wear that we have to blame.

YOUR PRETTY SWIM SUIT will look fresh all summer and last longer, too, if it's rinsed in cool water after each use. Also, wash it frequently with warm water and detergent. Even if you don't go near the water, body oils left in the suit can weaken the fabric. Pool water chemicals, sea water, sand and salt dull some colors and shorten the life of the suit.

CALORIES DO COUNT, including those in sugar on frozen fruits. If you're freezing your own, why not pack some without sugar, suggests Virginia Weiser, OSU extension nutrition specialist.

Peaches, apricots, apples and cherries darken unless you give them special treatment with ascorbic acid or one of the anti-browning products you'll find in grocery stores.

Before you buy fruits for freezing, Miss Weiser says to check on the variety, because some freeze better than others. OSU extension bulletin, "Freezing Preservation of Fruits and Vegetables," gives you details. Write us for your free copy.
