Registration Is Law, Warns Ontario Office Of Selective Service

The office of local board No. 22, Selective Service system in Ontario, issues a reminder that the law requires every young man to register on his 18th birthday anniversary or within five days thereafter unless on active duty, even though he may be a member of a reserve or the National Guard.

Failure to register on time is asking to be declared "delinquent" with the resultant possibility of being prosecuted or inducted ahead of others in the same age group who are registered, the office warned.

Eighteen-year-old youths are asked to contact the Ontario board office by phone by dialing 889-6322, in case of unavoidable circumstances which might make it impossible to register on time.

The office of the local board, located at 368 SW Fifth avenue, was closed July 15-16 and will be closed again Friday, July 19, according to an announcement by Mrs. Ruth L. Ingebritsen, clerk.

This arrangement is for one week only. Commencing July 22, regular office hours from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday, will again be resumed, the clerk said.
