Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

WHAT CAUSES YELLOWING OF WHITE COTTON? Women asked this question so often that home economics researchers at the U.S. Department of Agriculture decided to make a special study. They say one cause is accumulation of body oil. Home launderings do not always remove these oils. Over a period of time, especially in warm humid atmosphere, the oils turn yellow.

Tests show that bleaches, both liquid chlorine and dry perborate types, help whiten these yellowed fabrics. The scientists hope to eventually recommend ways to prevent the yellowing. We'll keep you posted as their experiments progress.

WHEN APPLIANCES ARE GOOD, THEY ARE VERY GOOD and when they are bad, we realize how much we miss them. Service problems still plague many homemakers but not nearly so much as a few years ago.

Mary Huck, economist for a large Ohio appliance manufacturer, gave us some good news on her recent trip to Oregon. She says records show that 1962 appliances required 40 percent less service than 1958 models, which in turn were much more reliable than those produced 15 years ago.

So, all in all, everything should be better and better. But are we doing a better job of reading instruction books? Service records show one out of every five calls made by servicemen to repair washers is needless, because nothing is wrong with the appliance.

Check to see that appliance is plugged in and controls properly set according to the instruction book before calling a serviceman.

DON'T LET INSECTS CHASE YOU away from outdoor fun. U.S. Department of Agriculture scientists have developed a repellent now available in ready-to-use containers.

This chemical scares off the better known biting insects—mosquitoes, ticks, chiggers. It won't hurt your skin, cotton or wool fabrics, but don't use it on synthetics. It may affect some paints and plasters. Check instructions on the can.

This product, commonly called Deet but sold under several trade names, has little or no odor and doesn't leave a greasy feeling on the skin.

OVEN CANNING IS DANGEROUS, says Virginia Weiser, nutrition specialist with OSU Extension service. It makes no difference what kind of jars, lids or oven you use. Jars are likely to explode, even though not tightly sealed. Serious personal injury could result.

There are no safe canning short cuts. Don't fall for trick canning methods such as use of aspirin for preserving fruits and vegetables.

Miss Weiser says you might be lucky for years with unreliable canning methods, but there comes a time when everything spoils. Always follow proper processing directions and you'll be better off in the long run.

If you have questions about canning methods, call your county extension agent in home economics.

WORKING WIVES . . . if your "moonlighting work" seems big after a day at the office, divide household chores into several short jobs. Make minutes count.

For instance, these jobs take about 15 minutes apiece: cleaning and polishing one piece of furniture, washing four or five mirrors, vacuuming mattress and bedspreads.

Ten-minute jobs might be straightening a bureau drawer, cleaning bottom of a closet, emptying waste baskets.

If you have five minutes to spare, you could wipe finger marks from kitchen cabinets and refrigerator, clean reflector pans under burners on the range or sew on a button.
