### Governor Notes National Week For Farm Safety

"With the meaningful theme of 'Inspection Plus Correction Equals Protection,' the period July 21-27 will be observed throughout America as National Farm Safety week," says Governor Mark O. Hatfield.

"As in other industries, safe operation of equipment in the field of agriculture not only tends to avoid the physical pain and heartache of personal injuries, but also assists in the maintenance of our economy.

"It has been said that safety, in general, can be brought about through adoption of the proper attitude toward operation of equipment and through continued devotion to safety as an individual habit. It is further noted that such safety must be accepted as an individual responsibility," the state head noted.

"During Farm Safety week, I urge all communications media to assist in reminding rural residents of the need for adhering to safe practices in the operation of farm machinery. One life saved, one painful injury avoided, loss of time and money alleviated—these are ample rewards for the practice of safety.

"It is my hope that National Farm Safety week will be but the beginning of a year-around program of inspection plus correction, and I am pleased to join with farm organizations, government agencies, agricultural suppliers and others in bringing Farm Safety week to the attention of all our citizens," the governor concluded.
