### BJC Registrar Gives Requirements Of Registration for Fall Semester

Boise Junior college registrar, Mrs. Alice Hatton, said recently that many students must complete requirements for admission before a permit can be granted to register for the fall semester.

She said that her office has been writing several permits each day but many applications can not be completed because students have failed to furnish all the necessary credentials.

Those applying to Boise Junior college are required to furnish an original transcript of high school credits signed by the principal, superintendent or other authorized official; official transcripts and statements of honorable separation from each institution attended after high school graduation.

Personal data on regular application for admission blanks, completed physical examination on forms provided by the college; three photographs—billfold size and character references on form provided by the college if the student is transferring from another college or if the student has been out of high school for more than one year are also needed.

Official score card from American college testing program; and a residency card signed by the student and parents if the student is under 21 years of age and by the student only if over 21 years of age, are other requirements.

Mrs. Hatton further stated that information and proper blanks can be obtained from her office in room 112, administration building. Also, high school and college records should be furnished on transcript blanks of the institution at which the work was completed. All credentials must be sent directly to the registrar of Boise Junior college.
