Newell Heights—The 5-H Horse club rodeo held Sunday evening at the Irvin Toppliff farm opened with a parade of nine youths riding stick horses, criss-crossing in fashion similar to that of a sheriff's posse.

The kids, ages 6 to 14 years, were dressed in jeans, white hats and shirts.

Announcer was Jane Timmerman who greeted those in attendance and expressed appreciation for their cooperation. More than 100 area residents were on the sidelines, seated comfortably on bales of straw.

The rodeo was held in a pasture, with colored lights on the fence. Two famous horses, "Cream" and "Sugar," were introduced and two clowns, Joan Timmerman and Gloria Holly, put on an excellent act.

Judges for the main events were Johnnie Timmerman and Louis Stam. Among spectators were the participants' aunts, uncles, parents, grandparents, great-grandparents and neighbors.

Stick horses, Black Comanche, Spider Legs, Apache and White Cloud, were ridden in the steeplechase. Spider Legs got lost, the rider came in first, but was disqualified. Mary Timmerman, on Apache, was declared winner.

Real horses were used in the fitness classes, including leading, riding and obedience. Twilight, ridden by Teresa Toppliff, won first in the leading division. In the riding classification, Jane Timmerman and her mount, Smoky, were first place winners. Joan Timmerman, on Danny, took top honors for obedience.

Pop corn and chances on cakes were available at the entrance. It is reported that those running the hot dog stand did a good business. In addition to hot dogs, they served cold drinks and coffee.

Winners of the cakes were Gerrit Stam, Dick Davis, Debby Brigrance, Mrs. Gerrit Timmerman and Janice Sutter. Harry Warren of Parma guessed the lucky number and won a jar of candy.

A king and queen of horses were then crowned. Named as equine royalty were King Johnnie Boy, owned by the Timmermans, and Queen Twilight, belonging to the Toppliff family.
