### J. Swager Returns From Navy Cruise; Given Promotion

John B. Swager, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Swager, recently returned to Nyssa from a two-week training cruise on board the USS Watts, a destroyer escort. During the cruise, the Watts sailed from Everett, Wash., to San Francisco and return. The crew was given three days of liberty in the California city.

Upon his return from the cruise, Swager was advanced from seaman apprentice to seaman in the Naval Reserve. He is a member of the Naval Reserve Surface division in Boise and drives to the Idaho capital city each Wednesday evening, along with several other Nyssa residents, to attend weekly drills of the division.

Seaman Swager has since been accepted for two weeks of duty at the San Francisco Naval shipyard where he will be given a series of tests to determine if he is mentally and physically qualified for duty in submarines.

He reported for duty there on July 28 and if found qualified he will be assigned to submarine school upon reporting for his two years' active duty in the navy in August. His commanding officer, Gene Stunz of Nyssa, reported that Swager is the first member of the Boise division to be accepted for submarine qualification tests.

Swager was graduated from Nyssa high school with the class of 1963. He joined the Naval Reserve in April of 1962 and through participation with the Boise division has earned two advancements in rating. He will now be able to qualify for a petty officer rating soon after going on active duty.
