

## Reservist Boards Destroyer Escort In Portland for Rendezvous at Sea

BUENA VISTA — Mrs. James Ritchie and Mrs. Silas Hoffman took Seaman Recruit Robert Ritchie to Boise on the morning of Aug. 1 when he took a plane to Portland and at 12 noon boarded the destroyer escort, USS McGinty.

Two ships were to leave Seattle that day and one was due to leave Tacoma for a rendezvous at sea. After three days at sea, the ships from the 13th Naval district are to join with reserve training ships from the San Francisco area, representing the 11th and 12th Naval districts.

With the arrival of these ships the group will form the first Task Force of reserve ships in the Pacific since World War II.

Nearly 400 Navy reservists from the northwest were due to take off on a "working vacation" cruise to Hawaii on Aug. 1 for an 18-day training session. They will be participating in the Navy's "Pacific Group Sail" summer training cruise to the "Paradise of the Pacific."
