Double Jeopardy Law **Provisions** Discussed

We have a provision in the Oregon Constitution against "double jeopardy." That's one of the important safeguards in our system of law which makes

given for the family last Friday evening at the Nyssa church. Members of the local congregation served as hosts at the welcoming event.





A classic example comes from the "Wild West" in the late 1880's. A man named Ball was charged with murder, along with two others. The guilty pair appealed to a higher Simpson recently spent several court and their original indictment was found to be faulty.

Once again the government accused all three men. Ball claimed his right against double jeopardy had been invaded and the U.S. Supreme Court agreed. He didn't have to stand trial again. The other two did and paid the penalty for their guilt.

The reason for the "double jeopardy" provision is to protect the individual from being hounded all his life. In old England, where the fear of tyranny first prompted safeguards for personal freedom, one court said:

"Were it not for this rule, anyone obnoxious to the government might be run down by repeated
