Milk Producers Of Area Request Distributor Pool

Harney and Malheur counties' grade A milk producers will continue to operate under a distributor pool instead of converting to the market pool established by law.

Producers of the two counties, which comprise Market Area 3, have filed a petition with the Oregon Department of Agriculture requesting that a market pool not be established.

Under the law, producers may petition for a referendum to establish a distributor pool instead of the market pool and, if two-thirds or more of the qualified producers have signed the petition, no referendum is necessary. The petition received from Harney and Malheur counties had more than the necessary two-thirds.

Producer prices set by the department continue to be in effect regardless of the type of pool under which the producers operate. Market Area 3 prices are: Class 1, \$5.20 for 4 percent milk with a butterfat differential of 8.5 cents per point; and class 2, \$3.38 on a 4 percent basis, with a 7.1 cents butterfat differential per point.

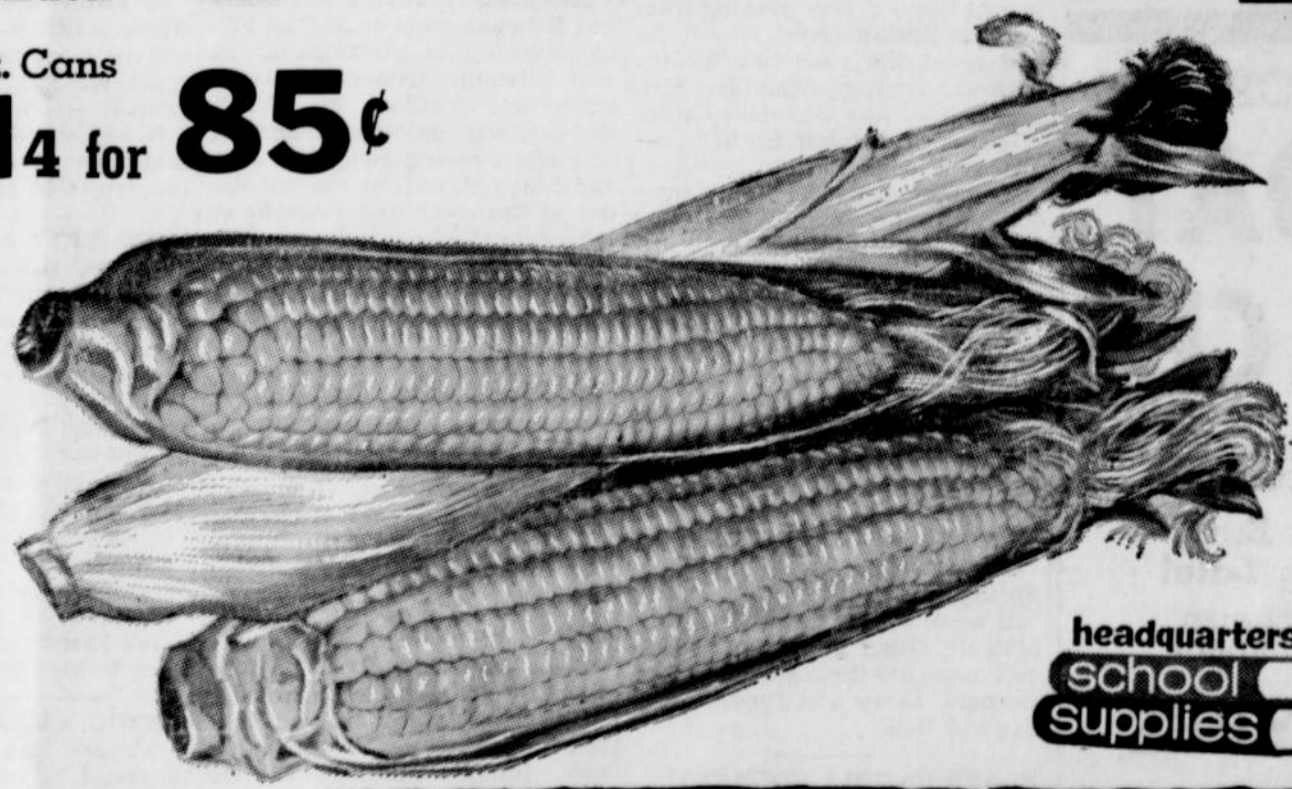
