Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

TO SMILE TAKES 13 FACIAL MUSCLES

... while 47 are needed to frown. But a lot of people evidently don't mind this kind of extra muscular activity. Just try to get them to walk two blocks down the street if the car is standing in front of the house.

PREVENT MILDEW

... in awnings and tents by treating with a mildew-resistant finish. These products can be bought at drug stores.

Awnings should be lowered immediately after rain so dirty water will not collect in folds and cause stains.

MANY REFRIGERATORS CONK OUT

... during this season. If you bought yours around 1950 or earlier, better have some money set aside. Surveys show you can't expect more than 16 years of use, sometimes less.

We're often asked what size to buy. This depends a lot on the family. It might help to know that nearly four out of ten families bought a 14-cubic-foot size or larger this year. Bigger ones get more popular each year.

BUSY MOTHERS . . .

Do you make the most of your automatically timed ovens? You can get extra bonus time away from the kitchen because the oven turns on and turns off in your absence.

Make sure foods you choose are safe to place in the oven ahead of time. Virginia Weiser, OSU extension nutrition specialist, says to thoroughly chill milk, eggs, meat and fish and don't let them stand more than an hour before cooking begins.

Roasts chilled to the core or frozen meats partially thawed can stand up to two hours. Puddings and custards that cook in a dish surrounded by ice water can stand an hour.

Why not practice using your automatic timer when you are at home so you'll feel confident you have operated it correctly?

DON'T BE HEARTBROKEN

... over a broken dish. Dishes can be mended with epoxy glue if you have all the pieces and they fit together. The mended dish can even be washed in a dishwasher because these new glues withstand heat, moisture and detergents.

Epoxy glues are the mix-as-you-mend kind. They take time to "cure" so you'll need a way to hold the pieces intact until the glue gets a firm grip.

For glue clues on which kind to use, read the directions on the container. Don't confuse epoxy glue with the milky white plastic glues. These are fine for decorative items, but they're not waterproof.

WORKING WIVES . . .

Have you wondered how other employed women handle their money? Seven out of 10 working wives pool all their paycheck with the husband, according to a survey made by home economists of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Two out of 10 keep all money separate, while a few pooled part and handled the rest themselves. The younger women were the ones who did the most pooling into the family purse. (We certainly hope this doesn't start any family arguments.)

FOAM RUBBER UPHOLSTERY

... is durable and comfortable but go easy on removing spots with dry cleaning fluid.

Sponge lightly. If the cleaning fluid soaks through the fabric covering, it will cause blistering and swelling of the rubber. Urethane foam, used in many chairs and sofas today, is not affected by dry cleaning fluids.

THE GRASS STAIN SEASON IS HERE

... You should remove the stain before laundering. Work full strength liquid laundry detergent into the stain. Or moisten the area and rub in granular detergent.

If stain remains, use bleach for fabrics which can take it. For those non-washable fabrics sponge stain with rubbing alcohol if you are sure it's safe for the dye. Test it first on an inconspicuous area.
