Alice Pickett Hired As Full-Time Nurse For Migrant Workers
A new health program for all migrant workers became effective July 25 in Malheur county with the hiring of Mrs. Alice Pickett, R.N., as full-time migrant nurse.

Funds for this program are furnished by the federal government through the Oregon State Board of Health. These funds provide for nursing services full time during the six months the migrants are working in this area and services of a sanitarian.

Drugs will be purchased for those unable to pay for needed medicines. Equipment needed and transportation for both persons employed are also furnished through this fund. The nurse and sanitarian will work under direction of Dr. E. J. Waincott, county health officer. Offices have been established at the Nyssa labor camp.

Mrs. Pickett comes to this position well-qualified through training and experience. She is a graduate of the Samaritan hospital nursing school in Nampa and received her bachelor's degree from University of Oregon medical school where she majored in nursing education.

She has had teaching experience in the University of Oregon medical school hospital, Emmanuel hospital in Portland and St. Luke's hospital in Boise. Since coming to Malheur county she has had nursing experience in Holy Rosary and Malheur Memorial hospitals.

Sanitarian for this program has not as yet been hired.

Numerous Alarms Keep Firemen Busy

Nyssa volunteer fire department has answered several alarms during the past week. On Saturday morning they were called to the country and upon reaching the location, found it was a false alarm.

At about 10:30 that night, they were called to North Fourth street where a small grass fire was burning near an abandoned residence. The blaze was extinguished and no damage reported.

Service Officer Tells Korean War Veterans Of Insurance Change

Korean war veterans who hold GI "RS" insurance policies have only until Sept. 13 to qualify for a special cash dividend by exchanging them for "W" term policies or converting to permanent insurance. Joe Maughan, Malheur county veterans' service officer, warned this week.

After Sept. 13, these veterans may still convert or exchange their policies, Maughan said, but they will no longer be eligible for the dividend payment.

Only GI insurance policy holders with "RS" insurance that was issued during the period of the Korean war are concerned in this program. On or before Sept. 13, they must:

1. Exchange the "RS" term policy for a "W" term policy, generally costing about one-third of what they are now paying; or
2. Convert the "RS" policy to a low-cost permanent plan of insurance.
