### Navyman Steven Patterson Witnesses Recent Equator Crossing Ceremonies

Steven L. Patterson, interior communications electrician fireman, USN, son of Mrs. Ileen Patterson of route 1, Nyssa, serving aboard the destroyer USS Radford, recently saw a number of Pollywogs become Shellbacks in shipboard ceremonies conducted by King Neptune and his Royal Court.

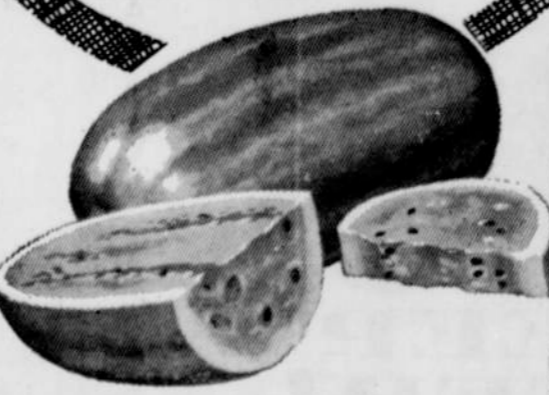
