## Books on Stock Market, Investments Head New List at Malheur Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, Aug. 31, at Malheur county library include the following:

"The Insiders" by T. A. Wise. Based on articles that appeared in "Fortune" mainly in 1959 and 1960 together with some earlier material revised in 1962, this guide is an objective account of how the stock market is run and some glimpses of the men who run it.

"The Kiplinger Book on Investing for the Years Ahead" by John W. Hazard. A balanced, complete guide to personal or group investing.

"Dusk at the Mountain" by Haynes Johnston. Report on the Negro in Washington, D.C., today.

"Impthal" by Sir Geoffrey Evans. A vivid description of a little-known 1944 battle of World War II on India's northeast frontier that prevented the Japanese invasion of India.

"The Salmon King of Oregon" by Gordon B. Dodds. An account of R. D. Hume and the Pacific fisheries.

"Portrait of Karl Barth" by George Casalis. An able summary of the life, personality and principal works of the noted Swiss theologian.

"Life in the Saddle" by Frank Collison. The experiences and memories of an Englishman from Yorkshire who became a cowhand on a ranch in Texas in 1872 and lived in that state until his death in 1943.

"Chemical and Biological Hazards in Food" by the International Symposium of Food Protection. A discussion of materials added to food products: vitamins, amino acids, trace minerals and preservatives.

"Courtroom Warrior" by Richard O'Connor. The colorful story of William Travers Jerome, first of New York's fighting district attorneys.

"Encyclopedia of Roses" by H. Edland. This book contains sections on cultivation and successful methods of rose growing along with 421 colored illustrations.

"Rags of Glory" by Stuart Cloete. A major novel about the Boer war.

"The Alexandria Quartet" by Lawrence Durrell. A group of novels, reprinted as one work, about a sophisticated, somewhat decadent circle of friends in modern Alexandria.

"Occasion for Loving" by Nadine Gordimer. A novel of love and hate in the shadow of racial conflict.

"Yankee From the West" by Burton K. Wheeler. The candid story of the freewheeling U.S. senator from Montana.

"The Cherokee Frontier" by David H. Corkran. A documented study of the extensive Cherokee nation in mid-18th century.

"A Book of Australia" edited by Tom Inglis Moore. An anthology of prose and poetry that gives a representative picture of the country, the people and the national way of life and thought of Australia.

"Life and Holiness" by Thomas Merton. The New Testament doctrine of the Christian life translated into the language of our day by a well-known Catholic writer.

"Indians of the Americas" by Matthew W. Stirling. A color-illustrated record.

"The Universe" by David Bergamini. The latest volume in the Life Nature Library.

"Plastics: Projects and Procedures with Polyesters" by Alexander F. Bick. A manual for school or home workshop projects using unsaturated polyester resin plastics.

"Pale Fire" by Vladimir Nabokov. Ironic novel-poem-puzzle with many levels of meaning. One of the notable books of 1962.

"The Shapes of Sleep" by J. B. Priestley. An adventure story that introduces Ben Stendrale, an English free-lance reporter who consents to ferret out the mystery behind the theft of a piece of green paper.

"The Reluctant Queen" by Molly Costain Haycraft. A romantic historical novel about Mary Tudor.

"Confessions of a Tobacco Addict" by Ben Petnecky. An account of a man's attempt to break his smoking habit through hypnosis.

"Of Time and Work" by Sebastian de Grazia. Critique of advanced industrialism as it exists in the United States today and of its effect on leisure.

"Contemporaries" by Alfred Kazin. Critical essays on literature ranging from the Romantics to the moderns.

"Gayelord Hauser's Treasury of Secrets" by Gayelord Hauser. The author's theories of diet, exercise, health and beauty care.

"Wounded Spirits" by Leslie D. Weatherhead. Case histories of spiritual and physical healing.

"The Pale Horse" by Agatha Christie. A story of a Catholic priest who was murdered after hearing a dying woman's confession.

"The Centaur" by John Updike. The story of this novel centers around the relationship between a 15-year-old boy and his father during three critical days in the winter of 1947.

"Lord Geoffrey's Fancy" by Alfred Duggan. Set in 13th century Greece and Turkey after the Fourth Crusade, this historical novel recreates the court life of the Frankish knights who were defending the Greek lands they had seized from attacks by the Byzantines.
