Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

HAVE YOU EVER BEEN HORRIFIED

. . . to see a lot of wrinkles when you look in a mirror lighted by fluorescent tubes? Don't despair; you don't really look that old! Someone just put in the wrong kind of fluorescent light and it's easily changed.

There are actually seven colors of white fluorescent tubes. In a bathroom, bedroom or kitchen use the deluxe warm white. This creates a warm atmosphere, is kind to skin tones, foods and all warm colors.

If your living room is blue or green, then the cool white tube should be used to enhance the color of the furnishings. If it is furnished with warm colors, then use the deluxe warm white.

AN ENTERPRISING STATISTICIAN

. . . has come up with this information concerning the average homemaker's job. Every year she washes an acre of dirty dishes, launders three miles of clothes, scrubs five miles of floors and washes one mile of glass.

Tell this to anyone who doubts that you really work. But also tell them that you're a manager. The jobs you do that really count can't be fed into the statistician's computer.

BROWN STAINS

. . . on the inside of a dishwasher are usually due to iron in the water supply. The glasses may also have a brown or yellow film.

To remove this stain, put ½ teaspoon of oxalic acid in the dishwasher and NO detergent. (First, remove any silverware, plastic or metal utensils.) Run the dishwasher through the regular washing cycle. When finished, add dishwasher detergent and let it wash through the complete cycle again.

PRECAUTION — Oxalic acid (available at the drug store) is poisonous. Handle with care and keep out of the reach of children.

Mrs. Dorothy F. Brown, Benton county extension agent, says that some women have reported successful use of citric acid for the removal of these stains.

OUTDOOR FURNITURE needs to be moved about to follow the sun or shade. To save your back, get your favorite do-it-yourselfer to put wheels on two adjacent legs of tables and heavy chairs. Then you simply pick up the other side wheelbarrow fashion and roll it about. The nice part about using wheels on one side of a table only, is that it doesn't roll away when you're cutting your steak.
