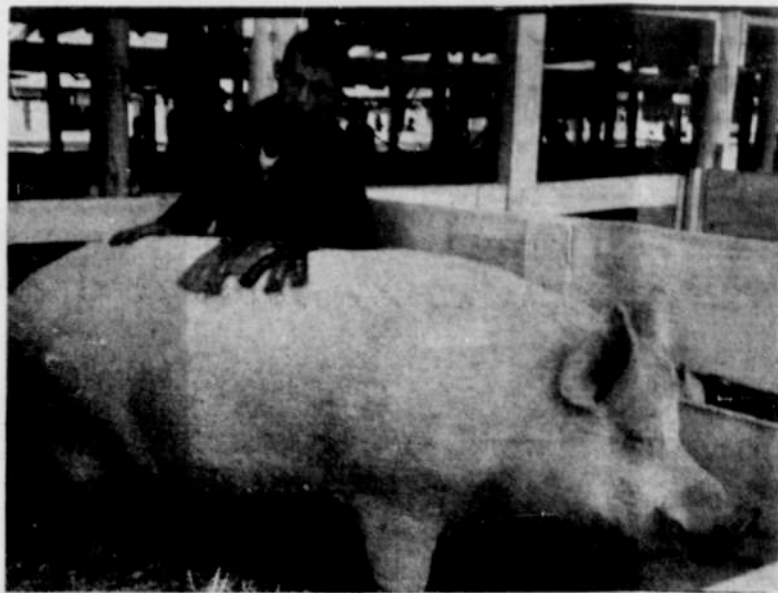

Large Percentage of College Students At OSU Are Becoming Bicycle Riders

Fall fashion note for college students—

Bicycles are now in style.

At Oregon State university this fall, about one out of every four students will ride a bicycle around campus. Bicycle use has been zooming upward the last few years and along with campus auto traffic, is getting special attention.

Last year there were almost 1200 bicycles on campus. Campus Police Chief Arthur Freundt has estimated that this fall there will be about 2500 bicycles licensed when the 10,000-plus OSU student registration is completed.

The big boom in bicycles has prompted campus police to draft detailed bicycle regulations for safety and cycling convenience. A license good for the campus and city of Corvallis will cost 50 cents and must be attached to the bike frame.

The university is installing special lanes along one-way streets and erecting small stop signs designed especially for bike riders. In addition, there are 1500 bicycle racks for parking on campus and another 1000 will soon be installed.

Why the increase in bicycles?

University officials note that since student cars are not al-

lowed on campus during the day, students have found that bikes save time enroute to classes. OSU's faculty members are also taking to bicycles as a means of transportation. They have found that bikes are handy to pedal to work and help beat the parking problem.

Loan of Administration Milosh Popovich thinks that "part of the bicycle popularity might also be attributed to the stress on physical culture these days."

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
