Kay Pobanz of Ontario tied for championship honors in the clothing judging contest. She and a 4-H member from Union county were able to spot more flaws in clothing construction than any of the other 120 girls in the contest. Kay's tasty giant sandwich she prepared during her senior demonstration won her \$25 from the Oregon Bankers association. She was also chosen as an alternate to the National 4-H Club Congress held each December in Chicago.

The Oregon Cow Belles awarded \$5 to Ann Kudrna of Ontario after she presented her demonstration on preparing Swiss steak.

In the senior dinner contest, Diana Bowers of Ontario served a three-course meal featuring chicken and received \$5 from the Oregon Fryer commission.

Nyssa Chapel Rites Conducted Monday For Mrs. Raffington

Funeral rites for Mrs. Harriet (Hattie) Roberts Raffington were conducted Monday afternoon, Sept. 16, 1963, at Lienkaemper chapel. The Rev. Armand Larive of St. Paul's Episcopal church was officiating minister.

Mrs. Raffington, 84, succumbed Friday following an extended illness.

She was born July 25, 1879, in Kansas and on March 12, 1901, was united in marriage to Walter Tyrrell (Doc) Raffington in Wagona, Okla. The couple settled in the Cow Hollow community southwest of Nyssa in 1936. They moved there from Taloga, Okla., where Dr. Raffington had practiced dentistry for several years, a total of 52 years in the state.

The Raffingtons celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary on March 10, 1961, when friends and neighbors gathered for a potluck dinner and dance in Cow Hollow hall. Mr. Raffington died on March 9 of this year.

Among survivors are two brothers, James M. Roberts of Clay, Mont., and Vern K. Roberts of Harper, Ore.; two sisters, Mrs. Marsha Hamilton of Canton, Okla., and Mrs. Sadie Starr of Detroit, Mich.

Interment was made in Owyhee cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper funeral home.
