C. Sorenson Retires From Air Force Duty

Major Chester Sorenson, Headquarters Section squadron, 465th Bombardment Wing, Robins Air Force Base, Ga., was presented the Air Force Commendation medal during his recent retirement ceremony.

Major Sorenson distinguished himself as commander of the Headquarters Section squadron from February 1961 to May 1963. The citation accompanying the medal read in part, "During this period, he demonstrated superior leadership and professional ability while acting as wing executive officer during the Cuban crisis."

Major Sorenson was born in June 1921 in Dickinson county, Kan., and entered the service in November 1942. He graduated from pilot training and was assigned to the 449th Bombardment Group, 15th Air Force, in Italy.

While assigned to this group, he flew 35 combat missions with a total of 250 flying hours in B-24's and was awarded the Air Medal with three clusters and the Purple Heart. In March 1959 he was awarded the aero rating of command pilot with a total of more than 6300 hours of flying time.

The retiring officer is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Sorenson of John Day, Ore., a brother of Marvin Sorenson of Parma and Mrs. Joe Cundall of Nyssa.

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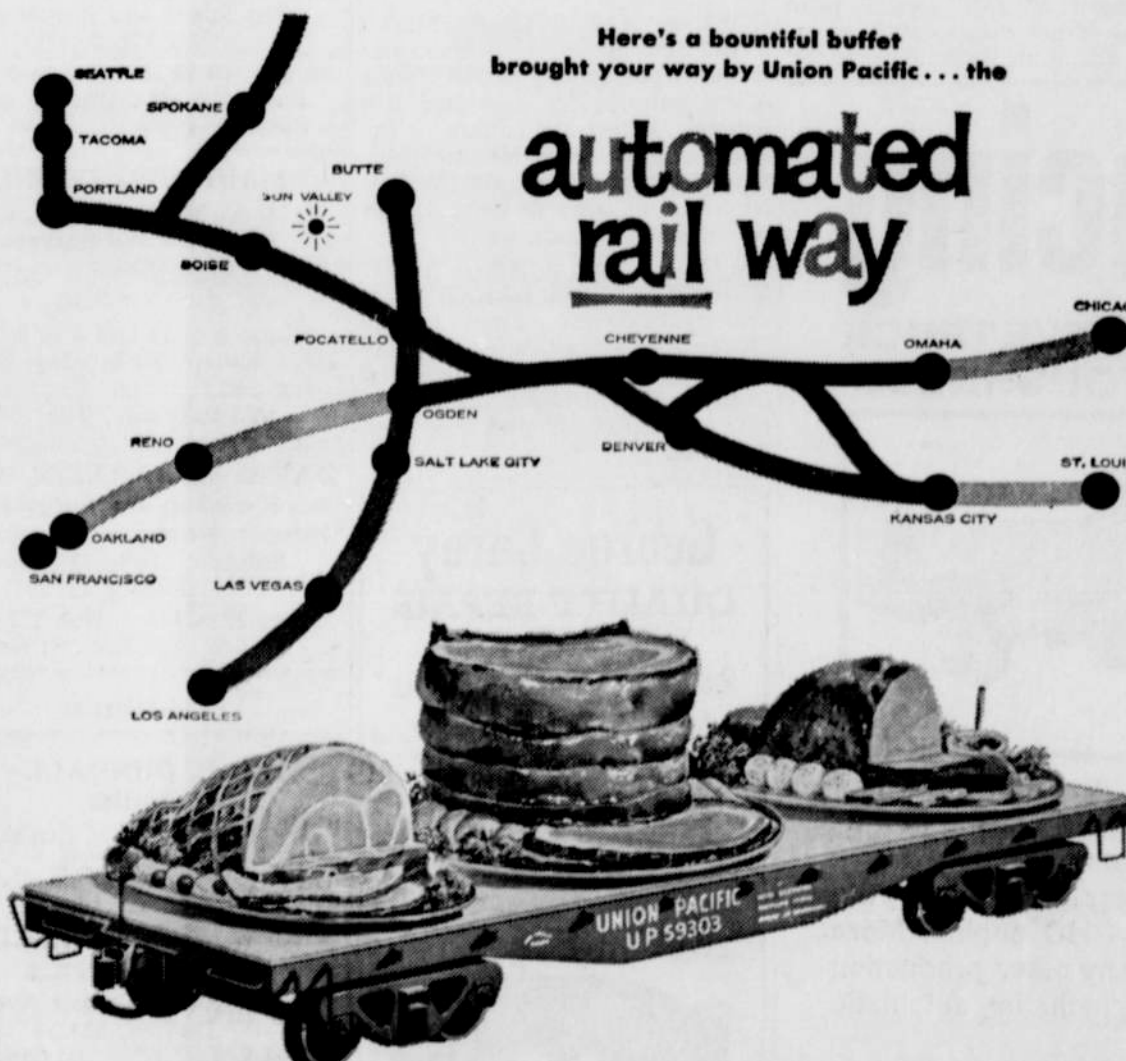
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
