Lesson was on "Outdoor Cookery" and featured a barbecued dinner with various meats and vegetables being cooked. Meats were inexpensive cuts including flank steak, liver and a frozen hamburger mixture. Other cuts of meat were marinated with tenderizer.

It was stressed by the leaders to be careful in choosing a grill if not using a commercially made one. The grill from an old refrigerator may contain some metal that would melt and blend with the food. A large sheet of foil was laid over a grill. The foil was then slit and folded around the bars to show how it could be used safely.

Seventeen members, five guests and five children were present for the outdoor dinner. There was also an ice-breaker in which the ladies decorated a table with cloths, runners, various floral and fruit arrangements. Menu consisted of seasoned dips, vegetables, potato chips and salads.

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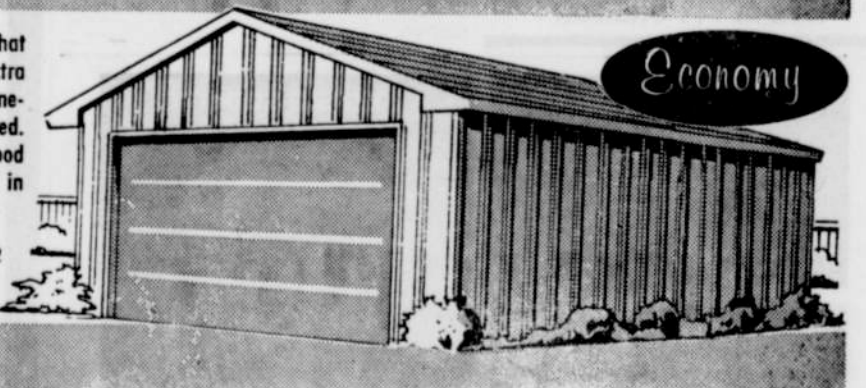


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
