### Lewis Returns Home After Naval Cruise On USS Canberra

Thomas L. Lewis, fire control technician second class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray C. Lewis of route 1, Nyssa, is serving aboard the guided missile cruiser USS Canberra which returned to the U. S. early this month after seven months duty with the Sixth Fleet in the Mediterranean.

During her Sixth Fleet deployment, Canberra took part in several U. S. and North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) naval exercises. Among the training operations was "Medlandex 4-63," an extensive amphibious assault in which Canberra provided shore bombardment for her Marine detachment's landings.

The Marines spent three days ashore under simulated combat conditions.

Ports of call during the cruise included Athens, Greece; the French Riviera and other colorful Mediterranean places.

An Atlantic Fleet unit, the 17,000-ton Canberra normally operates out of Norfolk, Va.

Daniel is taking U.S. history, trigonometry, chemistry, modern problems, physics and English III in that order. Physics is his hardest class because he is not

accustomed to using the instruments.

#### Praises Instructors

Daniel likes all his teachers and thinks they are "real nice." He stated, "The teachers want you to work for your own benefit. They give very good information and I won't forget that information."

"The kids are so fine and so friendly that I am not homesick. I like everybody and I am very happy here," commented Daniel when asked what he thought of the students.

When asked what he thought of the girls in the high school, Daniel said, "They are all so beautiful and so very nice. If I had to choose a girl friend, I wouldn't know which one to pick." Daniel isn't too fond of ratted hair but he stated that
