According to Librarian Joy Bell, the following books were recently added to the shelves at Nyssa public library:

ADULT READING

"Second Growth" by Ruth Moore. Red-headed J. J. Randall came to Hillville wholly unheralded. No one expected him; no one was prepared for him—yet he set in train a series of events that were to alter many lives.

"The Scarlet Boy" by Arthur Caler-Marshall. This story begins with a haunted house. George Grantley, middle-aged, conservative, a quietly distinguished biographer had played in the house when he was a boy. And when his friend, the noted and knighted barrister, Christopher Everness, asked him to find a place for himself, his wife, their daughter and their Hungarian cook, a place that could be made over into their idea of a home with room to sulk in, George, searching the neighborhood, was reminded of Anglesey House.

"Master Sermons Through the Ages" edited by William Alan Sadler, Jr. This extraordinary collection of the best sermons from the whole Christian era shows clearly how great preaching of the past can benefit modern man. Here are the sermons which continue to live beyond the time of presentation.

"Man and Dolphin" by John C. Lilly, M.D. This is the story of research now going on that may mark the beginnings of a major scientific breakthrough: man's attempt to communicate with another species. Dr. Lilly's first experiments with cats and monkeys convinced him that he must find an animal with a brain at least equal to that of the human one, and a body not too much larger than the human body.

"How Not to Kill Your Husband" by Kenneth C. Hutchin, M.D. "The number of women who deliberately set out to kill their husbands is surprisingly small," remarks the noted physician and medical writer who is the author of this book. Nevertheless, as Dr. Hutchin points out, many wives could hardly do a better job of slow killing, even if they tried. This is particularly true of the wives of professional men and business executives—just the men whose value to the community (as well as to their families) is irreplaceable.

"To Catch an Angel" by Robert Russell. It is not often that an autobiography written by a comparatively unknown young man is so filled with the author's wonder and zest for life that the reader feels a better human being for having shared the experience. Such a book is "To Catch an Angel."

"Althea" by Grace Zaring Stone. Althea is someone you have known all your life: a woman bruised by her past who lives in flight from the present, sheltered by a devotion gladly given in tribute to her charms.

"The Expert Dreamers" edited by Frederik Pohl. Science fiction is not just "gadget" fiction, social commentary or dramatized prediction of the future—it is all these things and more, for science fiction does not limit itself . . . any more than science itself does.

"God, Man and the Thinker" by Donald A. Wells. Anyone attempting to think critically about religion inevitably encounters the same problems that have puzzled thoughtful men for centuries. There are questions that cannot fully be answered but that must be asked. Without ever becoming doctrinaire, this provocative non-denominational book discusses the principal philosophies of religion in their bearing on these questions.

"Drugs and the Mind" by Robert S. deRopp. The story of the new and ancient drugs—from marihuana to "Miltown"—their effect on the brain and emotions, their potentialities for good and evil.
