Idaho Falls Service To Be Held Saturday For Mrs. John Wulf

Funeral services for Mrs. John C. Wulf, former Nyssa, will be held Saturday morning in Idaho Falls. The Rev. Paul Ludlow of Nyssa Methodist church will be officiating minister.

Mrs. Wulf succumbed Wednesday morning, Oct. 2, 1963, at a hospital in Idaho Falls following a long illness. She had been suffering from complications of diabetes and was hospitalized in Nyssa for several weeks before going to Idaho the latter part of June.

She was born Jeanette Young on April 1, 1886, in Lincoln, Neb. In 1909 she was united in marriage to John C. Wulf at Council Bluffs, Iowa. The deceased was a trained nurse and practiced the profession both before and after her marriage. She was a member of the Methodist church.

The Wulf couple came to the Nyssa area from Idaho Falls in 1936 and resided on a farm until 1954 when they purchased a home near Nyssa. They returned to Idaho Falls in June 1963.

Mr. Wulf preceded her in death on July 28 of this year.

Survivors include two sons, Richard Wulf of Idaho Falls and Forrest Williams of Twin Falls; one daughter, Mrs. Eula Leavitt of Idaho Falls.

Cuban Refugee to Speak October 8 At Meeting of Knife and Fork Club

Under the title "Cuba—Uncle Sam's Headache," Dr. Nicholas Gonzales Mendoza will be guest speaker at the Oct. 8 meeting of Knife and Fork club scheduled at 7:30 p.m. at East Side cafe in Ontario.

He is a refugee from Castro's Cuba and arrived in the United States in November 1960. Since that time he has been telling American audiences the story of what goes on behind the scenes on the island that threatens the Florida coast line.

Dr. Mendoza is a native-born Cuban. His family is one of the oldest and was one of the most prominent in the industrial, professional, business and social life of Cuba. His grandfather was the first chief justice of the Supreme Court of Cuba in 1902; Dr. Mendoza's father was commissioned an army captain by the United States Congress on appointment by President McKinley.

Served as Wartime Adjutant

He served as adjutant to both General Shafter and General Leonard Wood during the Spanish-American war.

Dr. Mendoza's brothers, likewise, held positions of prominence. One brother, Roberto, was Cuba's ambassador to Great Britain for seven years; Alfredo is an orthopedic surgeon in the U.S. and a sister is now in New York. Until forced to flee Dr. Mendoza had lived in Cuba almost all his life. He is a doctor of civil and administrative law and practiced his profession diligently.

Speaks Excellent English

He received a part of his education in the United States at Manlius Military Academy in New York and at the Wharton School of Business, University of Pennsylvania. He speaks excellent English.

For the energetic Dr. Mendoza, leaving Cuba was an action that had to be. It was "get out" or die. Those were Castro's orders. Castro himself occupied the Mendoza ocean-front house, with Mendoza left, along with a lifetime of accumulations in money and property worth \$1 million.

The Mendoza family is now living in St. Louis, Mo.
