

Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

DO YOU THINK A TIME PLAN IS IMPOSSIBLE . . . because you have too many emergencies every day? You're assuming that it must be rigid, unbending and requires strict adherence to be any good.

A workable plan is adjustable to suit circumstances. It should allow time for unplanned activities.

A good plan cuts time loss due to procrastination, and procrastination saps emotional energy by adding dread and dislike to many jobs that might otherwise be whisked by.

MONEY SAVER!

You can trim at least 10 percent, maybe more, off your grocery bill by taking advantage of specials at the supermarket. Mrs. Velma Seat, extension food marketing specialist cites research to back up this claim. But to make a savings, these items on special must account for a fourth of your purchases, so it takes a bit of planning.

Mrs. Seat emphasizes that you have to be able to use these items once you buy them or they're no bargain.

DO YOU THINK CARPETED ROOMS

are easier to care for than smooth surface floors?

Most people do. But home economics researchers found only 20 minutes less care was needed per week for carpeted floors. They did their experiments in homes of young married couples living in apartments.

There is a tendency to under-clean carpets because the hidden dust doesn't show. Most of the time the homemakers didn't move the furniture when they vacuumed.

On the other hand, dust shows more on smooth floors, so the women cleaned more thoroughly.

FROZEN FRESHLY BAKED ROLLS

lose only half as much freshness as rolls stored in a bread box for 24 hours, says Virginia Weiser, OSU nutritionist.

U.S. Department of Agriculture research to help commercial bakers can also be applied at home. Freshly baked rolls were wrapped in freezer paper soon after baking. Researchers found that defrosting without unwrapping in a warm place also helps maintain freshness.

WATCH OUT FOR WALNUT STAINS!

Nuts and leaves are falling and it's easy to track wet leaves onto your carpet. If this happens, get a professional rug cleaner; you'll not be able to remove the stains yourself.

For stains on washable fabrics which can stand high heat, boil in sudsy water. If stain remains, soak about five minutes in a diluted chlorine bleach. Wash and rinse all chlorine from the fabric.

BABY CLOTHES

often have brownish-yellow or black spots after laundering. What's wrong? These may be special stains, oils and acid soils that ordinary laundering won't remove.

Prompt stain treatment is important. Soak in cool water. Then wash in hot water (if fabric can take heat) with a little extra water conditioner or softener plus detergent.

If stain persists, use a bleach suitable for the fabric. Rinse thoroughly.

CANVAS AWNINGS

are due for a winter rest. To avoid mildew during storage, scrub awnings with a stiff brush and hot suds, then rinse. Leave opened to dry thoroughly before storing.
