Oregonians to Vote Tuesday on Special \$60 Million Proposal

Teacher associations over most of the state have also been actively supporting it for the same reason.

At a recent meeting of the Malheur county PTA council, composed of the presidents and legislative chairmen of the various units, it was recommended that the bill be retained.

In Nyssa the PTA held a discussion on the bill but made no recommendation how to vote. Mrs. Lucille Myrick, president, urged everyone to read the voters' pamphlet and then vote.

The Nyssa school board chose to remain neutral, as a body, and not try to affect the thoughts of local voters.

This issue of the Journal carries ads of two local groups—one favoring retention of the bill and one wanting it defeated.

Effect on Local Schools

According to figures furnished by the state education department, if the bill is rejected, the loss of revenue would probably be about as follows: Nyssa, \$20,000; Ontario, \$60,000; Vale, \$22,000; and Adrian, \$7,000. Treasure Valley Community college would lose building funds expected now.

These amounts are insignificant when compared with schools in Portland and some of the "poorer" districts receiving more of their funds from the state. The Portland schools would possibly have a loss of \$1 to \$2 million.

Polls conducted by papers in Salem and Portland indicate the bill will be overwhelmingly defeated—possibly by two-to-one.

Rep. Robert Smith Expresses Views On Income Tax Bill

On Oct. 15 citizens of Oregon will vote to determine whether or not they will be taxed to raise \$48 million for increased state government cost.

A "yes" vote will sustain a majority of the legislators and a "no" vote will eliminate the new increased tax law and thus require one of two alternatives.

Either the governor makes substantial cuts in the budget or a special session of the legislature will be called to rework the budget and tax program. Of these two possibilities, a special session seems most imminent.

Since the government by law, an attorney general's opinion, is restricted from cutting basic school appropriations, supreme, circuit and local court costs, the legislative budget, the secretary of state and state treasurer budgets and debt service; therefore leaving only a balance of \$245.5 million out of the original budget of \$403.7 million for possible reduction.

Therefore, the final decision should a "no" vote be cast next Tuesday, will rest upon the shoulders of a legislature which spent a record number of days, spending a record number of dollars establishing a record "flop."

The "no" votes on the referendum will be cast for two basic reasons:

(1) People hoping for a reduction in the budget and therefore no need for additional taxation.

(2) People who are unhappy with the present income tax who would favor another, such as a cigarette or sales tax.

Both of these reasons are valid, but optimistic in my opinion.

As one of those who fought desperately or vociferously for a reduced budget during the session, I question the judgment of sending the same legislators, who made the original debacle a reality, back to Salem for another try.

Also, as one who fought against and lost the income tax bill which you will vote on Tuesday, I doubt the possibility of another tax, sales or cigarette, emerging from this legislature.

As an economy-minded legislator, I foresee only the high cost of a special election (\$300,000), a long unpredictable expensive special session (\$8,000 per day). Should an alternative tax come forth, the probability of referral to the people and therefore more time and greater expense is a reality.

I know that most people believe as I, that we have more government than we can afford, but how can we with a "no" vote on Tuesday, in one day convince a legislature which in their first item of business raised their own salaries eight times, hired 24 employees unnecessarily for their own use, committed themselves to reckless spending and irresponsible action for 141 days.

No, I am not giving up! I believe the Oregon tax situation needs a stem-to-stern overhaul. The way to accomplish this is to change the composition of the legislature which I am confident the people will do in the 1965 session, when time is available to accomplish a reasonable solution to our tax difficulties.
