OSU Freshman Gives First Impressions Of Life at College

Dear Journal Gang:

I miss seeing all your smiling faces. I have, however found one girl in the house who likes C & W music as well as I do, so I'm not too lonely.

We must be kept pretty busy because it seems there is never time for anything. OSU is a little bigger than NHS. In comparison to NHS's 120, or whatever it is, OSU has about 3500 freshmen. I met a student whose graduating class was larger than Nyssa high's total enrollment. In fact his three-year high school had more students than the whole population of Nyssa.

Registration is quite a bit different from that at NHS. Instead of one sheet of paper for a schedule of classes, at OSU there is a 100-page book. It took me 2½ hours to register but my big sister helped me which speeded up the procedure quite a bit.

Choose Study Area Early

People were always telling me that it isn't important to decide what your area of study will be before you get to college because the first year is pretty basic anyway. That isn't true. It is best to decide at least the area in which you plan to study when you are a sophomore or junior in high school because there are courses in college that are actually high school classes condensed. So by not choosing an area early you waste precious college time taking courses you could have had easier in high school.

Also, if one changes his major after he has been in college for a while, he will lose credit for those courses which were designed only for the first major.

One thing that's different in college is that there are never faculty members watching your every move. They are there when you need them but they are always almost hard to recognize. Many times it is hard to tell a college student from a professor.

Foreign Students Enrolled

There are 400 foreign students and about 20 foreign exchange teachers here. We have a girl from East Africa living in our house.

I am staying in a cooperative, a living group where we save about \$200 a year by doing our own house cleaning, washing and food serving. We are served excellent meals. They tell me almost every girl who has lived here before has to watch her weight. The girls say they gain as much as 10 or 15 pounds in one term. Karen Saito, who is staying in Hawley Hall, said their meals were pretty good too. We are served a lot of starchy foods.

I was always told that college towns were terribly expensive but that isn't true in all cases. Generally, luxury items are terribly expensive (sweaters, sportswear and any really fashionable clothing). A sweater that would cost \$10 in Nyssa is \$15 here for exactly the same kind.

But on the other hand, umbrellas and raincoats are very reasonable and there is a good selection. Another general statement that isn't always true is that the university book store is as reasonable as anywhere. Although typewriters are less expensive than any place I have seen, waste-paper baskets are more expensive. Generally things are about the same as they are at home. I've seen Anne Stringer, Lor-

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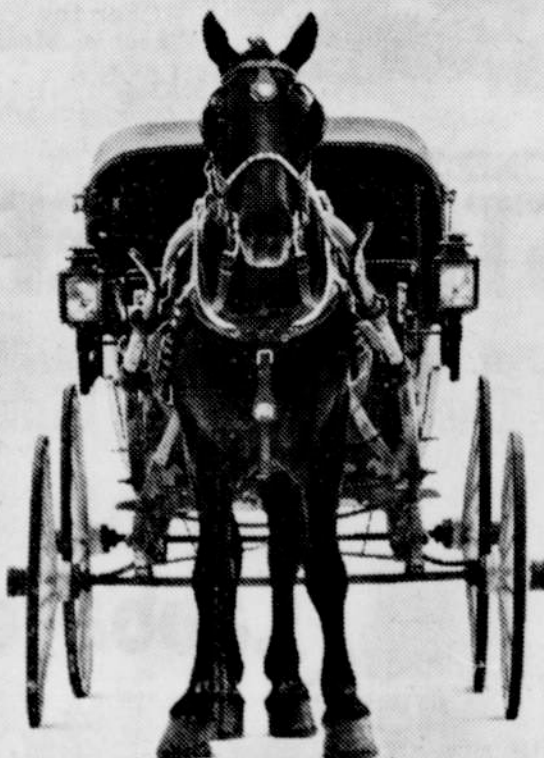
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Is this the reason

Horseless carriages weren't called horseless carriages for nothing.

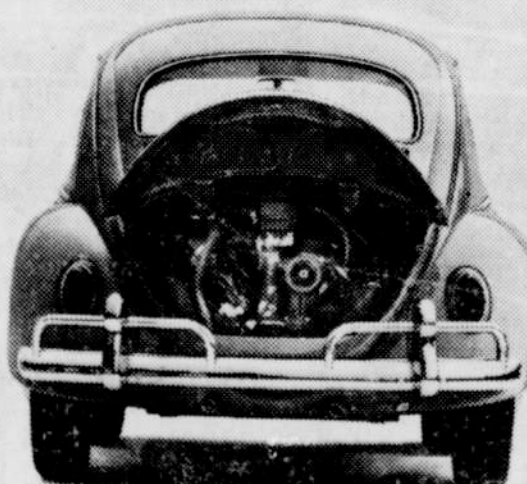
Gas engines may have taken the place of the horse. But the horse left its mark.

Early cars kept their whip sockets, long after there were no horses to whip.

Dashboards once kept the horse from splashing mud on the passengers.

And most cars have kept their engines up front, where the horse used to be.

When the Volkswagen was designed, it was assumed that horses would never be back.

So VW felt free to put the engine over the rear wheels, the ones that drive the car.

That way, you don't spin your wheels getting power from the front to the back.

Or horse around with heavy driveshfts.

You also get more weight over the drive wheels for firm traction when the going gets sloppy.

Actually, the VW's air-cooled aluminum engine would have been a sensation, even in front.

But the big idea was moving it to the rear.

It was a great step backward in the world of automobile design.

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
