Holladay, Portland, Oregon 97232, a request for publication of notice to all mineral locators or any person claiming under them, involving a mining claim or claims located on all lands belonging to the United States and under the jurisdiction of the Bureau of Land Management in the County of Malheur, State of Oregon described in full as follows:

That if any person claiming or asserting under, or by virtue of any unpatented mining claim located prior to July 23, 1955, any right, title, or interest in the above-described lands or in the surface resources and other surface resources, under such mining claim, contrary to or in conflict with the limitations or restrictions specified in section 4 of said act, as to the above-described lands, or any part thereof, shall fail to file in the Land Office of the Bureau of Land Management at 710 N.E. Holladay, Portland, Oregon, and within 150 days from the below-stated date of first publication of this Notice, a verified statement which shall set forth as to such mining claims:

(1) The date of location;
(2) The book and page of recordation of the notice or certificate of location;

(3) The section or sections of the public land surveys which embrace such mining claim, or if such lands are unsurveyed either the section or sections which would probably embrace such mining claim when the public land surveys are extended to such lands or a tie by courses and distances to an approved United States mineral monument;

(4) Whether such claimant is a locator or purchaser under such location; and

(5) The name and address of such claimant and names and addresses so far as known to the claimant of any other person or persons claiming any interest or interests in or under such unpatented mining claim; such failure shall be conclusively deemed (i) to constitute a waiver and relinquishment of such mining claimant of any right, title, or interest under such mining claim, contrary to or in conflict with the limitations or restrictions specified in section 4 of the Act of July 23, 1955 (69 Stat. 367), as to unpatented claims located after that date, and (ii) to constitute a consent by such mining claimant that such unpatented mining claim shall be subject to said limitations and restrictions, and (iii) to preclude thereafter, prior to issuance of patent, any assertion by such mining claimant of any right or title to or interest in or under such mining claim contrary to or in conflict with said limitations or restrictions. Section 4 provides, generally, that unpatented mining claims located after July 23, 1955 shall not be used for purposes other than prospecting, mining, or processing thereof; that such claims will be subject to the right of the United States to manage and dispose of the vegetative surface resources thereof and to manage other surface resources thereof; and that, except to the extent required for mining operations and uses reasonably incident thereto or to provide clearance for such operations or uses, claimants of such claims shall not use or dispose of vegetative or other surface resources thereof; and that, except for clearance for such purposes, any permitted severance or removal of timber must be in accordance with sound principles of forest management. Said section 4 also provides that any use of the surface of any such mining claim by the United States, its permittees or licensees, shall be such as not to endanger or materially interfere with the prospecting, mining, processing or reasonably incident uses by the mining claimant.

Ancient Architectural Styles Studied In Books Available at County Library

New books going into circulation Saturday, Oct. 19 at Malheur county library include the following:

"Chinese and Indian Architecture" by Nelson I. Wu. Discusses the influence throughout Asia of the Chinese world of walled cities and the Indian world of holy places.

"Japanese Architecture" by William Alex. Presents the buildings before the official end of Japanese isolation in 1868, giving most attention to temples and palaces.

"Pre-Columbian Architecture" by Donald Robertson. Architecture of the Aztecs, the Mayas and the Incas.

"Songs in America" by Burl Ives. More than 150 songs chosen by America's well-known folk musician and including songs of war and battles, death, love, religion, the sea, pioneer life and work.

"Shaping the World Economy" by Jan Tinbergen. A Twentieth Century Fund study that outlines world tensions arising from economic imbalances, examines their causes and advances some suggestions for their prevention.

"The Great Sahara Mouse Hunt" by Catherine Collins. An account of the travels in the Sahara of 14 English and Americans.

"I Will Fight No More Forever" by Merrill D. Beal. A documented account of the Nez Perce campaign of 1877.

"Palestine Before the Hebrews" by Emmanuel Anati. A history from the earliest arrival of man to the conquest of Canaan.

"The Supreme Court" by Alpheus Thomas Mason. In this closely reasoned, deeply committed study of the court, the author shows why it has a special responsibility toward the guarantees of the Bill of Rights as well as the right of minorities to participate in government.

"Politics of Foreign Aid" by John D. Montgomery. American experiences in Southeast Asia.

"Windfall Child" by Louise Field Cooper. The story of two families, of the child who "belongs" to both of them, of the crisis of love and indecision that brings them together to spend a two-week holiday in a small English country inn.

"Voyage In, Voyage Out" by Jean Rikhoff. A novel centered around a rooming house in Springfield, Ill.

"The Ideologies of the Developing Nations" by Paul E. Sigmund. An anthology containing nationalistic views of the leaders of the nations of Asia, Africa, the Islamic world and Latin America.
