NHS Band Plans Marching Display At BJC Festival

Nyssa high school band will perform Saturday in the Idaho District III Marching Festival at Boise Junior college, according to Frank Turner, music director. The event begins at 7 p.m. and the public is invited.

The festival is the only one of its kind in Idaho and one of the very few in the entire northwest. Better bands from the area, including Boise, Borah, Weiser and others, will each present a show similar to halftime entertainment during a football game.

Certain required movements are demanded of all bands but how these movements are incorporated into the show is up to the individual director.

Each band will be inspected by a general from Mountain Home Air Force Base before it performs. The show will be judged by three college music professors from Utah and the bands will be given ratings.

Ratings to Be Awarded

After all bands have performed, each will march onto the field again until all are together. At this point, ratings will be announced and trophies awarded to the best band in each classification determined by size of the school, and to the sweepstakes winner (regardless of class).

Because Nyssa is an Oregon school, it will be in competition for a trophy with Ontario and Vale only. As far as Nyssa is concerned, however, it will be in competition, whether real or imaginary, with every band in attendance at the festival, Turner declared.

Members of the Nyssa eighth grade band will attend the event as spectators and rooters. A number of residents of the community are also planning to attend. Due to the high vantage points afforded by the BJC stadium and because of the nature of the event, Turner urged all interested persons to attend the festival and get a really good look at Nyssa's marching band.

DAR Group to Sponsor 'Good Citizen' Contest Among Eligible Senior Girls

Malheur chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, Ontario, plans to sponsor a "Good Citizen" contest among area high schools including Adrian, Nyssa, Ontario and Vale.

The competition has been approved again this year by the National Association of Secondary School Principals.

Mrs. J. I. Brady of Nyssa, Malheur chairman of the contest, has reported that 10,869 good citizens were chosen last year, with 2,563 chapters participating, which reflects a steady growth.

Only girls who are seniors of an accredited high school are eligible to compete. They must possess qualities to an outstanding degree including dependability, service, leadership and patriotism.

The recommended selection is that students of each senior class select three girls possessing the required qualifications. From these three, the high school faculty will name one who will become the good citizen of her school. This is to be done during the week of Nov. 4-8.

The students' names will be submitted to Mrs. Brady, local chairman, who will contact the girls between Nov. 12 and 22. At this time each good citizen contestant will complete a questionnaire form and write a short story of her life. These papers must be accompanied by a small glossy picture.

Amalgamated Mails Checks Friday For Final Payment on '62 Deliveries; Stockpiling of Beets to Start Saturday

1962 Crop Brings \$1.10 More a Ton Than '61 For Additional \$800,000 to Area Producers

Area beet growers for Amalgamated Sugar company will receive their final checks for the 1962 crop and start stockpiling the 1963 crop on Saturday of this week.

According to Henry Zobell, district manager, growers will get \$1.10 more per ton for the 1962 beets than they received for the 1961 crop, due to higher sugar prices during a good portion of the past year. He said this would bring \$800,000 more into the area than the same amount of beets grown in 1961.

Sugar Content Down

The sugar content is still down from normal and rising very slowly, Zobell said, due to the extremely warm, moist weather. But the contracts that have been completed show tonnage up to 27-plus per acre where the last field estimate showed 25.5 tons.

It is hoped that the weather will be much cooler by the time stockpiling starts to eliminate present danger from spoilage. However, the manager said there would not be any more delay as size of the crop prohibited that. He said this was the first time that an extension had been asked of growers and was also the latest date that stockpiling has been started.

Factory Sets New Record

The Nyssa plant is running at capacity with three shifts on duty daily. New processing records have been set and broken already during this period.

The top record was made one day last week when in excess of 6900 tons of beets were sliced during one 24-hour period.

Nysson Ron Stephen Leaves for Antarctica Weather Assignment

Ronald Stephen, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Stephen, left Nyssa Saturday morning for Travis Air Force Base, Calif. On Tuesday he departed by plane for Honolulu, then to Christchurch, New Zealand, and from there was flown to McMurdo station in the Antarctica region.

The story of his assignment by the U.S. Department of Commerce Weather bureau appeared in the Aug. 8 issue of the Journal. The 22-year-old Nysson will serve as a physical meteorologist at Byrd weather station.

Sam Hartley to Serve As Five-Year Member Of State Potato Group

Sam E. Hartley of route 2, Nyssa, has been reappointed to the Oregon Potato commission by Governor Mark O. Hatfield, according to R. S. Besse, Jr., county extension agent.

In making the appointment, Governor Hatfield stated, "I know that Mr. Hartley will continue to serve the state of Oregon in the best tradition of public service."
